THE SIZE OF CITY LOTS. To an investor in the east the large 50 foot lot adopted in many towns on the Pacific slope gives the impression that the town is not only a village but intends to be a village permanently.

The limit of width of the ordinary structure, exclusive of the buildings of unusually wealthy firms or residents, is 25 feet or thereabouts in all compactly built cities. Very many of the valuable residences of New York are only 23 feet in width.

Is it possible for there never to be a city north of San Francisco which will in time be larger than that city? This question is often asked; and probably answered affirmatively by the residents of Seattle, but we think it is not within one century that this will be seen, or two.

There is a marked difference between the harbors of the Atlantic coast and those of the Pacific. In the first place they are much more frequent as there are more large rivers emptying into the sea and the indentations in the coast are numerous.

Canadian Pacific engineers are locating a line to Colville, Wash. It will tap a rich mineral district.

It is said that Salem still owes \$30,000 in 15 year bonds on the wagon bridge which went out at that place.

The American iron bark Annie Johnson has been chartered by the Alaska Packing company to load canneries supplies for Alaska.

August Peterson was killed last Wednesday near Barnett, a small station on the Cascade division of the Northern Pacific railroad, by a premature blast of giant powder.

A petition has been filed in the superior court of Chatham county, Wash., asking for the dissolution of the Puget Sound Co-operative colony on account of extensive frauds by the directors.

The Whatcom county commissioners have adopted the plans of W. A. Ritchie of Seattle for the new \$70,000 courthouse there, and he will probably get the contract for the construction.

The loss of stock in Baker county will not exceed 5 per cent. There are hundreds of tons of hay in the valley which was held in reserve, but as the snow has nearly all disappeared from the hills, and the grass is already starting, much of the feed will be held over.

United States Attorney L. L. McArthur has instituted proceedings on behalf of the government against A. M. Simpson, R. W. Simpson, A. W. Reed and G. R. Emerson, prominent lumber dealers with headquarters at San Francisco, to recover \$84,000 feet of timber unlawfully cut along the banks of Smith river, valued at \$6258.

General John E. Ross died at his home, near Jacksonville, of heart disease, last Monday. General Ross was a member of the Oregon State Pioneer's association, of the Jackson county Pioneer's association, and an Indian war veteran. He had lived in the vicinity of Jacksonville for nearly forty years, and was one of the bravest and most valiant of Oregon's frontier defenders. He leaves a wife and nine children.

Four timber men started a week ago last Saturday to go to their claims eighteen or twenty miles above Brownsville, says the Albany Herald. They came very near perishing in the snow, which was eight feet deep. Luckily they found a cabin, where they stayed over night, without food. They arrived at their camp next morning. Last Sunday they ventured forth again. There was still five feet of snow when they came out.

Last Monday morning, Vancouver people were treated to the sight of a genuine volcano in active eruption. A loud report was heard in the south, as if of a peal of distant thunder. Later flames were seen issuing from the peak of Mt. Jefferson, which is in the Cascade range, about 80 miles southwest of Salem, Oregon. The flames were followed by clouds of black smoke, which rose high above the mountain and drifted away. It was a grand sight.

The prisoners in the Lane county jail, six in number, cut their way out last Tuesday night. They secured a saw and after sawing a piece off the the lining pushed out a stone, which made a hole in the wall large enough for them to creep through. So far their whereabouts remains unknown. Real, the timber land swindler, was probably the most important criminal, the other five were all candidates for the Nelson penitentiary for various offenses, with the next grand jury was to investigate.

W. Nelson, of the state of Washington, some time since sold a hydraulic mine in Baker county to the Nelson Mining company of Oakland, California, through S. W. Blaisdell, a mining agent for \$300,000, and was paid \$85,000 in cash and took mortgage. He began suit in the United States circuit court against Blaisdell. The Nelson Mining Company and others to restrain Blaisdell from enforcing a decree of foreclosure obtained upon a \$50,000 note and mortgage, which Nelson alleges was unlawfully in his possession, and which he transferred to his cousin for the purpose of being bought back by Nelson, through S. W. Blaisdell, on the side of the mine in order that he might get a title to the property covered by the mortgage. Nelson also seeks to restrain their judgment, which he claims was obtained collusively with the intent of defrauding him out of a balance of \$265,000 due him.

The dead body of a tramp, burned and mangled, was found beside the narrow gauge track, near Annsville, in Marion county, recently. A coroner's jury, after hearing the testimony of the witnesses and viewing the remains, returned a verdict declaring the body before them to be that of a man perhaps sixty years of age, and to them unknown, there having been nothing by which to establish identity. They thought it was the body of a tramp, and that he had met death while sleeping beside his camp fire.

During the night a wind arose and a large limb of the tree under which he was lying was blown to the ground. Its butt end struck him squarely on the head, mashing it as flat as a board and spreading it over considerable space. The fall of the limb scattered the fire, which communicated to the dead man's blanket and then to his clothing and the leaves that formed his bed.
