She met some heavy winds and rolled enough to thoroughly sicken most of the passengers. There were 185 persons in the cabin and 65 in the steerage. Several prize fighters were on board, which created some talk. The freight list was very large: 1,256 tons were brought up from San Francisco, of which 65 tons were for Astoria. Much of the freight was piled up on the upper forward deck. This may be the last trip for the present of the Santa Rosa, now that the Oregon is running, unless business compels her continued use.
