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THE CITY AND COUNTY OFFICIAL PAPER. There will be an adjourned meeting of the chamber of commerce to-morrow evening.

As the cargo that came up from San Francisco yesterday were several tons of soldering metal. It was shipped to Portland parties but as most of it is to be used by cannery in the city orders were given to put it off here.

THE CABLE FRANCHISE ACCEPTED. The Final Papers Filed by the Construction Company.

Everybody has been waiting for the final act. It has come. The Astorian can assure its readers that the cable line is surely going ahead. Within the limit set by the franchise, work will be commenced on a system of cable railroads that will rival those of Portland.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. W. A. Dennis, representing the Pacific Cable Construction company, filed with city auditor Jowett the company's acceptance of the franchise granted them by the council. The document was short and simply expressed the agreement to the conditions and requirements of the franchise.

Work will be commenced within the city limits as soon as possible. Mr. Thompson, the president of the company, will arrive on the Santa Rosa next Friday, and make the final arrangements. Everything will, hence, soon be in readiness and the first steps toward a great help to the city will be begun.

He said that he had great trust in the future of Astoria and felt that the Cable company ran no risk in building extensively in this city. Everything is practically perfected for the work, and the arrival of Mr. Thompson will give a direct impetus to matters.
