STILL MENDACIOUS. The Columbian still insults the intelligence of both its readers by continual falsehood relative to this matter of press dispatches.

The Astorian has compelled it to tacitly take back some of its assumptions, but that mendacious sheet still deals in falsehood, which, indeed, seems to be its only stock in trade.

In a characteristic editorial it yesterday deals out more lies which will be promptly exposed by this paper.

Lie number one is that THE ASTORIAN applied to the Western Union for a press report. In this the Columbian is relating some of its own amateur experience. THE ASTORIAN cut its eye teeth long ago.

Lie number two is that the California Associated Press is a weak concern. That organization was established in 1830, it supplies some of the best papers in the country, and is ahead of its rivals.

Of course it cost more to secure its franchise, the Columbian couldn't touch it, but then that is no reason why that sheet should so shamelessly lie about the matter.

Lie number three is that anything is the Astorian office is stolen. In this regard the Columbian can't help talking about its own system which, of course is only natural.

The admirable report that THE ASTORIAN gets every night, is paid for at a higher price than the Columbian can afford.

Lie number four is that if the Columbian were to suspend, the telegraph office would close at eight o'clock. Not much. The life or death of the Columbian, has no more effect on the time the Astoria telegraph office opens or closes than it has on the tide in the Columbia river.

As fully shown heretofore, THE ASTORIAN'S associated press franchise is an extensive one, exclusive and permanent. THE ASTORIAN pays no more attention to the antics of whatever ephemeral sheets start or stop, than it does to the sport of summer flies.

Meanwhile, the proof is plain and easy. The Astoria public is asked to compare. Look at the two reports. THE ASTORIAN'S set solid, of good quality and more of it; the Columbian's weak, lashed out to make a show, and some of it never received by wire but fixed up in the Columbian office, all same Pioneer. Were it necessary, THE ASTORIAN could enter into this subject at greater length, and show up some of the dirty little tricks attempted by those folks.

But we have here confined our remarks to a brief showing of the Columbian's falsehoods, and the animus that prompts those silly falsehoods with which they hope to prop their cause.

It may be difficult for the Columbian to realize that purely as a matter of business, apart from any principle of right, it is better for it to tell the truth. Its readers (both of them) will agree with us that lies only stand till exposed, and for an alleged newspaper to so grossly tamper with the truth, is an insult to the audience it desires to address.

The real estate sales recorded to date this year, foot up over \$900,000. Sales not yet recorded will, it is believed, make the aggregate of real estate transfers in Astoria for the first 65 days of 1890 about \$1,000,000.

Our View of It.

At the citizens' meeting last night it was decided to accept the proposition of Hunt to raise two million dollars bond for him to build his railroad from Hunt's station in eastern Oregon to this city, a distance of two hundred and twenty miles. William S. Ladd agreed that if the bonds were raised he would head the list with \$500,000. Mr. Hunt wanted to know if the road should stop at Portland, or should it be extended to Gray's harbor, Astoria and the Sound. He said it was his intention to get the long haul of what was now made by the Northern Pacific from Eastern Oregon and Washington. Extending the road to Astoria, Gray's harbor and the Sound may be a good scheme, but it would strike the average person that with the road to these seaports, much of what Mr. Hunt expects to land to Portland will find its way to these other points and never see Portland. It will be like the Northern Pacific making Portland a terminus and then moving it to Tacoma and building the switchback and leaving Portland a way station.—Portland Examiner, 5.
