The Canadian senate has decided that Canada has no use for a mint and that American gold coinage will answer all present purposes.

The most prominent "telegram" in the Columbian's dispatches last Thursday was one dated "February 24th." The editor forgot to change the date to March 12th and the paper was a silent testimony against its compilers.

A labor agitator who recently went to Mexico says that cotton mill operatives there are little better off than slaves. He says they work twelve and fifteen hours a day for \$2.80 a week, and must work at night, on Sundays or holidays if their overseers should order them to do so.

The McKinley tariff bill proposes to increase the tariff on tin plate from 1.1 cents to 2 cents per pound, thus almost doubling the duty on every box of tin plate brought to Astoria from England to be made up into cans in which to put Columbia river salmon. The argument of the promoters of the proposed raise is that the United States is the greatest market for tin ware of all kinds in the world; that the tin plate works in England have increased from 367 to 480 in the last five years; that we have large tin mines unworked in this country, and if the duty is made sufficiently protective the industry of manufacturing tin plate will ultimately be transferred from England to this country, and the tin plate will be furnished much cheaper than it is at the present, or has been at any period; that a start must be made sometime, and that such a start will never be made till the duty is raised, affording sufficient protection to encourage home production of this much used metal.
