JAMES ZOHRAH, England's minister to Hayti, is in New York on his way home for a visit. Chatting with a reporter about Haytian affairs, he expressed the opinion that there would soon be another fight in that country. Perhaps that is the reason he is getting out.

EMPEROR WILLIAM, of Germany, appears to be growing so fond of making after dinner speeches as Chicago's friend, Chauncey M. Depew. It is noticeable, however, that what William says, being backed by an army one million strong, carries greater weight than Mr. Depew's utterances.

MR. HENRY VILLARD has notified the twin cities of St. Paul and Minneapolis that if they will place \$1,000,000 at his disposal he will issue stock to them for the amount and make that neighborhood the greatest manufacturing center in the entire northwest. But as he makes this liberal offer conditional upon the twin cities dropping their rivalry and working in harmony with each other, it does not seem to stand in much danger of acceptance.

A MISSOURI man who lost his eye in a railway accident sued the company, and a jury has just given a verdict in his favor, the award being \$10,000. The company has appealed. The officials do not think an eye is worth any such sum. If the value of a human life is only \$5,000, which figure is now pretty well established by precedent, it is no wonder they demur. If this verdict is approved there will have to be a thorough and radical readjustment of anatomical values.

A LONG lease on a 500-acre farm in England expired the other day and another lease was issued to the same tenant. He has been paying \$5,000. For the coming year his rent will be only \$2,500. The reduction is more than a half and is chiefly due to the increased offerings of very cheap food from this and other countries.

STILL more indicative of trouble in the old world is apparent in the telegraph dispatches on the first page, which came over the wires last night. Disruption of cabinet by wholesale resignation, and a growing socialistic sentiment are enough to keep Germany in hot water, while England and the other nations have gigantic strikes to look out for, which may yet result seriously. Labor must be fairly treated by capital, or the trouble will not be all on the other side of the Atlantic. Our own fair land is almost on the verge of an impending crisis, which can be averted only by a little more regard for the rights of the laborers and producers of the country.

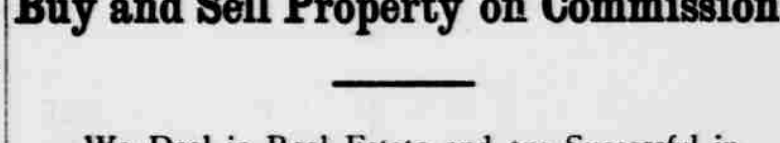
