The Oregonian thinks that in Portland, East Portland and Albina there are 85,000 people like enough.

Several prominent farmers of Walla Walla, have received threatening letters that they will be killed unless they stop buying land and reduce their rates of interest.

Two parties are necessary in any free government, says The Dulles Times-Mountaineer, but a third party must be placed in the same category with the proverbial fifth wheel to a coach.

Kansas has woman suffrage, and Topeka, the chief city, has 50,000 inhabitants. For the municipal elections to be held this month only about fifty women have expressed their desire to vote by registering.

According to the Engineering News, railroad building in the United States will be pushed more vigorously this year than last. Work is progressing on 5,038 miles of new lines, 7,041 miles have been surveyed and 2,831 are projected, or a total of nearly 15,000 miles.

SECRETARY NOBLE'S decision against the validity of the Valentine scrip meets with the approbation of all at Seattle except tideland men, who have filed on 3,455 acres on Seattle, Tacoma and other harbors. If they do not get their scrip back the filers will lose \$345,500, as the scrip cost on an average \$100 an acre. The land involved is valued at \$20,000,000. The scrip men say they will take the case to the United States court.

The cost of the proposed Niagaragan canal is now placed at \$95,000,000. The distance between the two oceans is 169 miles, but only twenty-nine miles of canal will have to be dug. The San Juan river must be deepened and some artificial basins constructed in the valleys of other streams. Lake Niagaragan affords fifty-six miles of free sailing. The Suez canal, which was cut out of the soil and sand for 100 miles, cost \$81,000,000.

Says a Washington dispatch: Representatives Herman, of Oregon, and Wilson of Washington, when not occupied by committee work, have been devoting themselves to the improvement of the mail facilities in their states. The number of petitions that each receives indicates that mail matters have been badly neglected. General Clarkson says that there are more complaints from Montana, Washington and Oregon, than of any other sections, and that these complaints are just, but the department has no funds to remedy them.

There has seldom been a better suggestion than the one now proposed by the international conference, as given in the telegraphic dispatches on the first page. It is that a national monetary union be established by the various nations represented, and that an international silver coin be issued, uniform in weight and value and which shall pass for use in all those nations. This would prove a great blessing to ship owners and to importers and exporters of goods, and is one more link in the chain of peace and fraternity which is gradually binding the leading nations of the world.

MARINE NEWS AND NOTES.

The steamer Manzanita has gone down the coast to place in position a whistling buoy off Coos bay.

The steamer Columbia came up from San Francisco yesterday morning, left 110 tons of freight here, and then went up the river to Portland.

The steamer Telephone is being painted outside and in, put in first class condition, and is expected to come down the river next Monday.

The British bark Ericscourt in addition to what has landed here, has 1,500 boxes of tin, and 2,300 sacks of salt for this port. She pays total duties at the custom house on her cargo, of \$5,518.

The steamship Oregon came down from Portland and sailed for San Francisco yesterday morning, taking from this port 4,08 bundles of shooks, 18,532 feet of lumber, 483 bundles of pulp, 141 sacks of potatoes, 128 sacks of oysters, and three tons of general merchandise.

The British ship Saint Mildred has a large cargo of tin-plate and general merchandise. For Astoria she has 3,000 boxes of tin-plate for Balfour, Guthrie & Co., and 2,300 boxes of tin-plate for Meyer, Wilson & Co. The present duty is 1.1 cents per pound, but it is liable to be nearly doubled before the present session of congress adjourns.

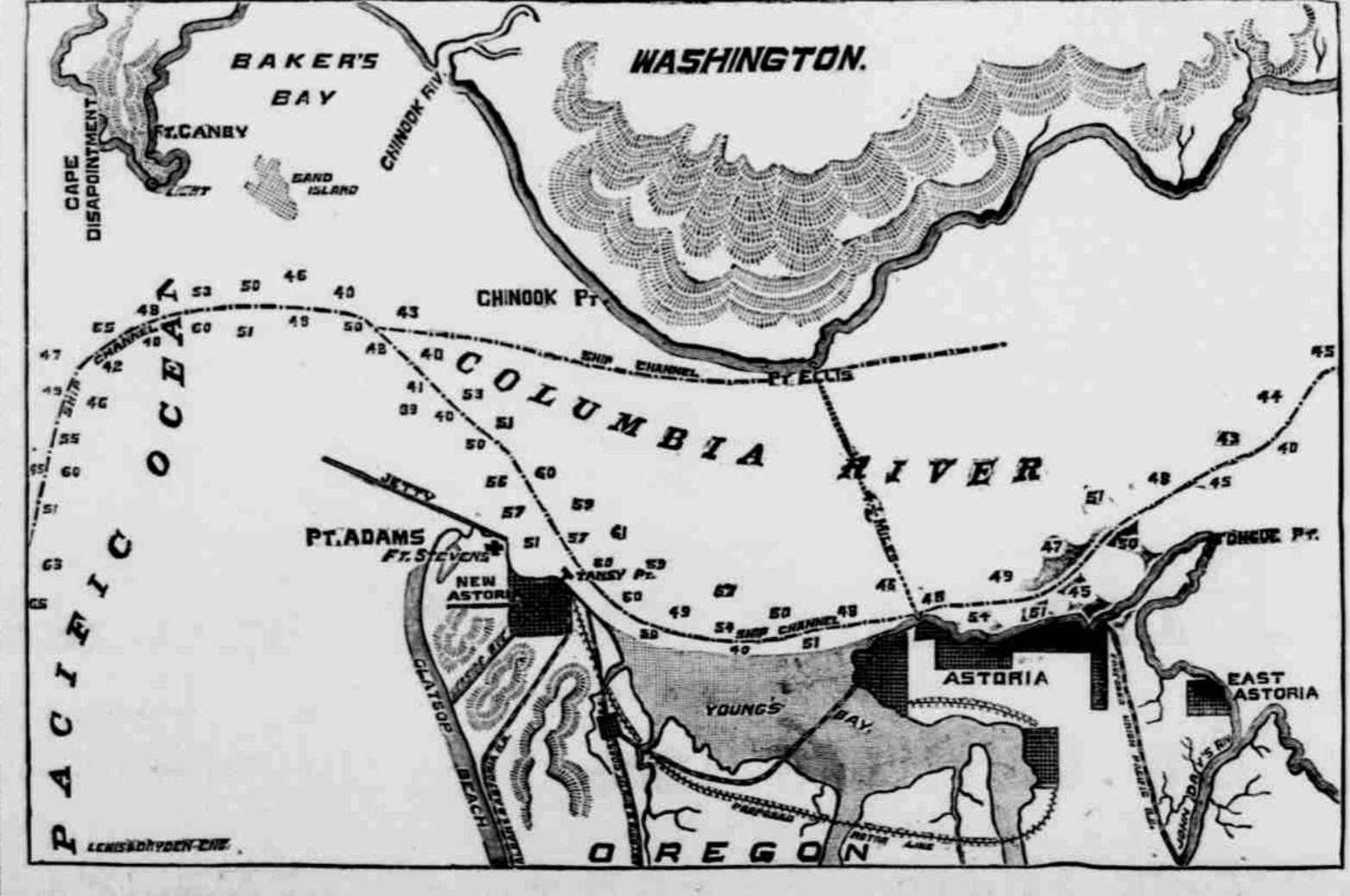
