One of Edward Bellamy's proposals is the national control of the railroads, employes are said to be slaves. and it is remarkable to see that a practical man like the president of the Chicago & Alton railroad advocates the purchase by the federal government of all railroads engaged in interstate traffic. The ground on which he bases his recommendation is that recent railroad legislation has made the business so difficult and unprofitable that there is nothing left short of government ownership and the operation of the roads on public account, not for profit, but for the accommodation of the people. He takes, of course, much too gloomy a view of the outlook and apparently attributes the present unsatisfactory condition of railroad business to the wrong cause. 'The great international railroad to connect all the countries of North Central and South America, which is recommended by the resolutions adopted by the Pan-American congress, is the outgrowth alike of popular sentiment and practical engineering science. The bonds between the American republies, which are growing stronger each year, would be immeas urably strengthened by a great railroad of this description. Its practicability has been pointed out by railroad experts of the highest character and authority, notably by George R. Blanchard in an address delivered last fall, in which he pointed out the fact that some 2,000 miles of construction would unite the present systems of railroads in the North and South American continents. The initial step contemplated by the Pan-American congress is the appointment of an international commission of engineers, three from each government, who shall inquire into the practicability and advisability of such a railroad. In the event that these points are demonstrated the commission shall proceed to make plans for its construction, receive bids and make concessions and grants to persons who will undertake to build and manage the line There are other details, but the main matter of congratulation is that the congress has inaugurated a public imrovement which is everywhere recog nized as the most important since the first Pacific railroad was projected.
