EDITORIAL MENTION. The tariff is of less present importance to Oregon than taxes. Taxes would be less if there were no allowance for indebtedness. To take away that burden it is only necessary to have a legislature pledged to do it. The members of the legislature will be elected on June 2nd. Only men pledged to the repeal of that exemption clause should be sent to Salem. In the voters' hands is the power to destroy or perpetuate that fraud upon themselves.

REPRESENTATIVE Wilson's bill, cutting down the fees paid to registers and receivers in the state of Washington for entries and final proofs, will reduce the price of pre-emption entries from \$3 to \$1.20; homesteads from \$22 to \$18 in railroad limits, and \$16 to \$14 outside; and the price of taking testimony will be reduced from \$27.50 to 15 cents per folio.

An agent of a leading railway company who was in Portland recently, told of a boyish prank of his when he was in the employ of the railroad years ago. The road was then constructing that part of its line which touches the St. Lawrence river, and the wife of one of the English contractors was writing for an English magazine. One day when the boy was acting as driver for a party who were enjoying a slight ride upon the glare ice of the river, they saw a number of small fishermen, with their little fish houses upon hand sleds, a stovepipe issuing from each roof, going to the fishing grounds. The boy asked what the buildings were and was told by the wretched youth that it was a custom with the inhabitants of this country to build their houses upon sleds, and that the winter time was their season of moving. This story, illustrated with a sketch of the houses, soon after appeared in English publications, and the bold, bad boy was unconsciously lauded by an irate husband immediately upon the wife's ridiculous blunder coming to his notice. It is to be feared that other English writers on America have been the victims of similar misplaced confidence.

THE proposition of the Chicago bankers to take \$23,000 city bonds at 6 per cent. interest to run 20 years would result in a present saving to the city of two per cent. per annum on some of the indebtedness. On the outstanding warrants eight per cent. interest is accruing. To pay those off in cash borrowed at six per cent., and leave a little cash surplus in the treasury would be a good idea; to get the money at a still lower rate of interest would be a better one. It looks as though Astoria ought to be able to borrow at 4 1/2 or 5 per cent.; eastern cities negotiate loans at 4 and even 3 per cent. Our local bankers say that the proffer of the Chicago bank is better than they could do. Of course if the bonds were held here they would be taxed; held outside the state they escape taxation.

That is a silly piece of legislation reported in this morning's dispatches, where the senate agricultural committee reported a bill transferring the fish commission to the agricultural department. Should it pass the senate it is to be hoped that the house will be guileless enough to defeat so foolish a measure. The fish commission is now doing valuable work. If it is made an attachment of the ruta buga department it will have its usefulness seriously impaired, if not wholly destroyed.
