It is none too soon to agitate the matter of Oregon's proper representation at the world's fair in Chicago. Our state should have adequate showing of its varied products.

The tide land question in Washington is not yet settled, and interested parties in Washington and Pacific counties will have to wait a year yet before final action is taken in the matter.

For a comparatively trifling amount Astoria can get a million dollars' worth of advertising. We allude to the proposed trip of George Francis Train around the world. The Astorian will chip in \$100. The money can and should be easily raised. But there cannot be much delay about the thing.

Devotion Day is a day hallowed by patriotism, ennobled by sacrifice and consecrated to the memory of those who died for their country.

WELL, how about that big hotel? Those schemes should not be allowed to end in just talk. A good newspaper, a good theater, a hotel are three prime factors in building up a city. The Astorian appears every day in the week, every day in the year, without intermission: the theater is being brought up to existing requirements: how about that hotel?

WASHINGTON papers say that they expect to see Washington ahead of Oregon in wealth as illustrated by the forthcoming census returns. It is not improbable. Washington has no law taxing mortgages or allowing exemption of indebtedness in assessor's reports. Oregon has both, and those twin fetters of progress are enough to cripple any commonwealth.

AFTER eight months of successful effort as editor of the Port Townsend Morning Leader, W. L. Jones has sold that paper; in his farewell he says that those eight months have broken him down in health, and that his success has been purchased at the price of shattered nerves and an embelled frame. Jones goes to Honolulu to recuperate and will be heard from again.

THE Union labor party prohibition ticket, put up to lure away Republican voters, will not have any weight this year. A few were fooled in '88, but fewer still will swallow the bait next Monday. Democrats generally vote a straight ticket, and the preponderance of those who throw their votes away in side shows comes from the Republican ranks. The moral is obvious.

"The fact is well known," says the Seattle Press, "that any railroad line that successfully bids for an equal share of the commerce of the Northwest must enjoy every facility, including the safe and economical union with deep sea transportation. The uses of a railroad do not end with a coast line; they extend across the ocean and to foreign lands." Our sound contemporary thus tersely outlines the reason why Astoria should and shall be a railroad terminus.

Now Astoria Engine Co. No. One gets a team of horses. Let us hope the insurance magnates will not hear of it for a week or so. As soon as they do they will put up the rates in Astoria. They always do. Every time an advance is made in the efficiency of the fire department go the insurance rates. When we only had two leather buckets and a broken wheelbarrow the rates were not as high as they are now, with the best and finest equipped volunteer fire department in the northwest.

An Illinois man saw an advertisement several years ago calling for white pennies and offering \$15 a thousand for them. Since then he has devoted a large part of his time to the collection of such pennies, and now he finds himself with several thousand of them on his hands and the advertisement lost. The Spokane Falls Review thinks that he ought to join hands with the Oregon man who got an idea into his head that the United States government had offered a reward of \$100 for the planting of an American flag upon the summit of Mount Hood. The days of heroism are not past. We have heroes all around us, ready to do deeds of daring at any moment. There was a fire at Seattle last Thursday morning, burning eleven buildings containing lodging houses. Here is an episode of the dreadful scene, from a dispatch relating the progress of the fire: "Among the many melo-dramatic incidents at the fire was the rescue of W. W. Corbett and family, a Chicago newspaper man, by Wm. Barber, of Tacoma, who proved himself a veritable hero. While the flames were at their height Barber noticed the woman holding a babe in her arms in the third-story window of the Pioneer house. He ran up the stairs adjoining the house until he reached the third story, where he found an alley eight feet wide and forty feet deep between the two houses. Without an instant's hesitation he sprang across the chasm and caught the window sill opposite. Gropping through the smoke and flame, he found the room, grabbed the woman and threw her on the mattress held by men beneath. He next lowered the child down, then seized Mr. Corbett and saved him the same way, though the man was dazed by the smoke and resisted his rescuer. Then the brave man swung himself out, landing safely on the mattress, amid the cheers of the immense crowd, who watched the thrilling rescue with horror depicted on their faces. If Barber had fallen in his leap from window to window he would undoubtedly have been dashed to pieces. It was one of the most gallant deeds performed in the year."
