NOTWITHSTANDING the constant heavy emigration, the population of Great Britain has increased more than 40,000,000 since 1855. The total population is about 38,000,000.

It costs \$50 fine and six months' imprisonment to "savagely beat and almost kill" a chief of police at Plymouth, Pennsylvania. Material for chiefs of police must be a drug in the market at Plymouth.

THE largest greenback extant is worth \$10,000, and there is only one such note in existence. Of \$5,000 notes there are seven, and when you come down to the every-day \$1,000 note, "there's millions in it."

SIXTY-EIGHT election officers have been indicted for election frauds by the Hudson county, N. J., grand jury. Seventeen true bills were returned against the members of each election board. Each board is composed of four members. The charge is conspiracy.

A HUMAN being is said to have been living for over thirty-six years in a wild and naked condition in the mountains near Grimsby, Ont. He was recently talked with and gave no reason for his living in this way. He claims to read the Bible, is a Christian in belief and can play the violin.

THE Oregonian or William Ried, or both make a mistake in attempting an alleged point regarding the reported purchase of bonds. This paper did not publish it "\$5,500,000," but "\$2,500,000." The mistake arose in the Oregonian office and not here, where the amount was published correctly.

Every one remembers the importance and effect in 1888 of the Oregon election and its 7,407 Republican majority, on the presidential contest in November of that year. As in 1888, so in '90: the eyes of the nation are looking toward Oregon; the response should be as emphatic as two years ago.

THE latest report from Jersey is that General Boulanger contemplates making an expedition to Africa. He says he will never again enter politics, and that the French people are ungrateful to their exiles and martyrs. He is anxious to serve his country on the remote frontier if not permitted to do so at home, and declares that he would rather die the death of a soldier than rot in political exile.

THE senate public lands committee has reported a bill repealing the timber culture land law and amending the laws relative to the purchase of arid lands. In making final settlement the bill recognizes the work already done in the way of timber culture by the present holders of the land. It requires the expenditure of at least \$3 an acre on arid lands before title to the same can be perfected.

Does it ever occur to any one of the purchasers of Louisiana Lottery tickets to inquire how it is that the company is in a position to offer the Louisiana Legislature \$25,000,000 for a renewal of its charter for a term of twenty-five years? The company declares, as an excuse to the people of Louisiana, that only three per cent of its receipts come from the people of that state, and it wants to be chartered to fleece the people of other states.

BACK and forth flows the tide of theory as to the ultimate atoms of matter. Once it was thought matter was all one substance. Then, as time went on, sixty different original elements were supposed to be discovered, and the number was gradually increased till none could predict where it would stop. Now chemists not a few are tending back to the old belief that all the different substances are one original, universal matter in different stages of cooling. Perhaps the next step will be to deny the existence of matter at all, along with bishop Berkeley and the mind cure people.
