## WELCOME.

To-day Astoria welcomes the delegates of the A. O. U. W., who come to our seaside city to hold their annual session.

They represent a great beneficial organization; a brotherhood who hold that fraternity and charity and mutual assistance are not so much a silent precept as an active duty, and are doing a noble work in providing practical help to the widow and orphan over whose stricken forms they throw the mantle of instant relief. An order that has in this country 240,000 members; that spent for beneficiary purposes \$4,200,000 last year, and that affords a sure fund in case of the death of the head or support of the family, deserves recognition and applause for the good accomplished and the magnitude of its results. THE ASTORIAN welcomes the delegates, and hopes that their visit will be a pleasant one, and the result of their deliberations conducive to the lasting benefit of the great order they represent.

## COMMENCEMENT.

PERHAPS a hundred thousand boys and girls have graduated from school in the last month and put out upon the mercies of the cold world. They will all believe they are going to conquer the universe in some way. The pupils in the lower classes of their schools will look up to them as to superior beings, and with the music, the bonnets, the sweet incense of applause and the new clothes the graduates themselves cannot be blamed for thinking they are something uncommon.

They will learn better fast enough when they come to rub against the world. They will learn that nobody is anybody very much, and that the world values people only in proportion as they can help it in some way.

Most of these young people, if they are of the right sort, trust mankind. They believe there is such a thing as disinterested friendship, as true love and the realization of high and generous hopes. And so there is. Only they will be told first thing on their entrance in the world that there are none of these things; that human life is nothing but a selfish, savage scramble, every man for himself and the devil for them all.

Boys and girls, don't believe it. Keep your own hearts always warm, generous and true. See to that and you will be sure to meet others like you. It is the natural law of attraction.

Then again, do not give up your lofty dreams. You can achieve them, though it is infinitely harder than you now think. You must knock long and desperately at the doors till you are almost exhausted, but they will open to you. Know that for certain. Success is dead sure to come to the one who works hard enough and waits long enough. It generally does not come in the way he expects, hardly ever, in fact, but that only proves that his way was the wrong way. For this reason it is not well to be too set on your own particular road up the hill. Keep your minds always open or receptive, so as to recognize the best when it does come. So shall you keep your lives high and pure, so shall you not crystallize into hard, mean, stingy mortals.

## JOY THAT KILLED.

HAPPY Bernard Heeny! He was an iron molder at Rockland, Ill., rough and boisterous when intoxicated, but a good fellow withal. On his wedding day he was very merry. He and some friends celebrated the event noisily. A policeman interfered to stop them. A fight followed and the officer was killed. They were arrested, and Bernard was sentenced to imprisonment for life in the Joliet penitentiary. It was a doleful ending of his wedding day. He served out part of the sentence and behaved well—so well that his sentence was shortened. The good tidings were brought to him that he would be free in October. Heeny was overjoyed. After all the nightmare dream of the murder, the dreary days that followed in the state's prison, he was to step forth once more into the world a free man among men. He had picked up acquaintance with Neobe, the anarchist, and on getting the good news hastened to tell him of it. Neobe listened and Heeny talked. But suddenly, in the midst of the story, the speaker threw up his hands and dropped to the ground. When they raised him he was dead. A sudden heart attack, brought on by his excitement, was the cause.

THERE is something imposing in the fact that New York will enter the closing decade of the nineteenth century as the second city in the world. The census estimates say 1,700,000, but less than Paris, but this is an inadequate expression of what New York really is. Brooklyn, Staten Island, Newark, Jersey City, the inhabited places that compose New York, depend upon it, build it up, added to the accepted figures of the city, alone easily give the metropolis 3,000,000. London surpasses this, but early in the twentieth century New York will be trying conclusions with London.

It is remarked as a curious fact that a certificate representing one of our silver dollars, if carried into Mexico, can be sold at a premium of more than 20 per cent. over the Mexican silver dollar, which contains more silver than our own.

GOLD is the talisman that opens almost every avenue to success, and it is for gold that all mankind are struggling. Over the wires there flashed last night the startling intelligence of the discovery in Colorado of the richest gold mine ever known, rivaling even the richest strikes of California in the days of '49. Thousands of men will flock to Tincup, and if the vein holds out, the stirring scenes of a gold camp will be enacted. Vividly it will bring to the mind of old residents on this coast recollections of similar events in which they were active participants. The confirmation of the telegraphic reports will be watched with eager interest all over the country. Meanwhile investments in Astoria real estate are sure to bring gold to the fortunate investors. There is no chance of loss.

Two recent utterances on the status of the negro in the Christian church are in marked contrast. One was by Archbishop Ireland, Roman Catholic, who has declared that no church is a fit temple of God where a man, because of his color, is excluded or made to occupy a corner. The other was by Bishop Keener of the Methodist Episcopal church south, who thanked God that the Methodist Episcopal church south is "solidly white." Northern Methodist journals do not hesitate to say that the Roman Catholic prelate's view is more in accordance with the spirit of Christianity.

POSTMASTER-GENERAL CLARKSON says the postal service expenses last year were \$72,000,000 and the earnings \$68,000,000, which leaves a balance of only \$4,000,000 to be provided for. He thinks that the railway postal clerks are very poorly paid, considering their dangerous work. There were eleven clerks killed and eighty-five disabled in the railway service last year—more than in the army.

## A LETTER FROM PORTLAND.

PORTLAND, July 5, 1908.  
EDITOR ASTORIAN:  
The business men of Portland had determined to have a grand celebration on the Fourth of July, and had raised a nice sum of money to be expended for the entertainment of the good people who might chance to come from the far corners of the nearer villages of Salem and Vancouver, to see the greatness of Portland and learn how every farmer, every mechanic and merchant patron has contributed toward the erection of a grand hotel, banks and stores in this wealthiest of Pacific-coast cities. Yes, everybody could come for half fare, but it would be an act of base ingratitude to a hospitable entertainer to carry away either gold, silver or paper money, when the visitor is kindly offered so many opportunities to invest or deposit the few remaining paltry dollars he will not need when he reaches home again. Everybody comes to Portland to see old acquaintances of years gone by. All kinds of church and other associations too meet here; grand lodges of every known order, corporations and contractors. In fact no matter where they live, or what scheme they have in view they all seemed to have their eye on Portland, even the fish commissioners maintain a friendly acquaintance with each other through their frequent visits to the metropolis. But now this entire city is sorely troubled the time allotted by government for the enumeration of the people has expired and yet it is said several thousands have not been counted. This is however a tender subject, both to the city and the enumerators.

Steamboat inspection seems to be attracting the attention of the public at this time, and Astorians with their showwater buy companions are the sufferers now. The steam captain inspector of hulls has ordered the *Clara Parker* to tie up at her own dock and report to the custom house. She was built about ten years ago, but her days of usefulness are suddenly cut short. There are a number of boats now in daily service that antedate her construction by several years, are they not too old, and too rotten to bear a close inspection? Or is it necessary for the large corporation to have their boats inspected, and comply with the United States steamboat law as individuals are compelled to do? There is a class of men who when placed in positions of trust or authority, assume a wonderful importance in their own estimation when dealing with individuals, but a big steamboat company can change a man's estimation of himself and his duty very quickly, assuming if they are troubled in the way down the coast. But our officers will doubtless how to the line and be just to rich corporation or poor individual, without prejudice or partiality.

The placing of the A. & S. C. bonds is hailed by every Astorian as a stroke of good fortune, and now what can further hinder the work from action and substantial progress. M.

## MARINE NEWS AND NOTES.

The steamer *Dolphin* arrived from Shoalwater bay last evening.  
The steamer *Cosmopolis*, Capt. Geo. Dinkens, had a large cargo of freight for various ports on Puget sound, including 500 sheep and four cars of steel rails.  
The steamship *City of Topeka*, Capt. David Wallace, which sailed for Alaska, took from here 21 packages of groceries and 541 bundles of shooks, and had over 700 tons of freight.  
The steamers *Printer* and *Typhoon*, which left here early yesterday morning for Gray's harbor, were met at 9 o'clock yesterday morning, opposite Shoalwater bay by the steamer *Alliance* on her way down the coast. They were going up all right.  
The steamer *Alliance*, Capt. Peterson, arrived from Gray's harbor yesterday afternoon, and left soon after for Portland. When at Hoquiam, last Thursday evening, her propeller came off, but fortunately was caught in the iron shoe, and the vessel was towed to the beach, where the propeller was again put in place.
