The twelfth annual session of the grand lodge of Oregon and Washington, Ancient Order United Workmen, convened yesterday morning at 10 o'clock at the opera house, grand master workman T. A. Stephens in the chair.

Lodges lost 7; gained 8; present number of lodges 93; grand members, 499; number of beneficiary certificates issued, 792. Membership for the last six years is as follows: 1887, 1888, 3,241 in 1889, 3,612 in 1890, 4,020 in 1891, 4,349 in 1892, 5,039 in 1893. The assessed grand total for the year was 19 in 1885, 18 in 1886, 22 in 1887, 17 in 1888, 20 in 1889, 25 in 1890, making an average of 19.15 per year.
