NO MORE ROCK FOR FORT STEVENS. The Failure to Pass the River and Harbor Bill Causes Delay.

By reason of the delay in the pass age of the river and harbor bill which has passed the house of representatives and is now pending in the senate, Major Handbury has notified Mr. yesterday, where they exhibited to crowded houses, and will go to San Francisco this morning on the steam—more rock can at present be received for the jetty at the mouth of the Columbia river. His work consequently is suspended. All the barges belong-ing to the plant are now loaded with rock that will be used exclusively for sinking and holding down the mattresses to be made during the coming

> The government steamer Cascades. Captain W. H. Whiteomb in charge, goes down the river to-day with seven barges, carrying over 3,000 tons of rock. This is probably the largest tow ever managed by one boat on the Columbia river, and is a practical demonstration of what can be done in the way of water transportation on this river.
