 The new substitute engine on the Astoria & South Coast road did duty yesterday in a satisfactory manner. In this locomotive superintendent Thompson recognized an old acquaintance, the engine having been in former active service on the Cascade division. It is now known as 1366, but is the same engine of which he changed the grade some years ago.  
 It's a pity that assistant postmaster-general Clarkson wasn't invited to Astoria on his recent visit, but it isn't too late yet for our chamber of commerce to aid in preserving the present standard of efficiency of the postoffice. Postmaster Hare has been notified of the raising of the office, and unless additional help is secured the present service cannot be kept up. Immediate action in this matter is imperative.  
 In the Justice Court.  
 Justice Cleveland yesterday had plenty of business, all criminal.  
 Five fishermen who had been arrested on complaint of fish commissioner R. C. Campbell, were charged with fishing for salmon during the close season. Their names were John Elliott, Thomas Crane, John Service, James Jones and John Lamson. Bail was fixed at \$100 in each case, and was furnished. At 6:30 P. M., on motion of the prosecution, the cases were dismissed, the fish commissioner declining to prosecute.  
 Harry Larsen was charged with petit larceny, the case having been continued over from the previous day. The prosecuting witness filed satisfaction, and on her paying the costs of prosecution the case was dismissed.  
 August Salmon Fishing.

But it is now an open secret that a large number of canneries on the lower river are still causing fresh salmon, and a mourning minority of conscientious canners who laid up their boats, took in their nets and paid off and discharged their working force, are compelled to be disgusted spectators while their adventurous neighbors catch and eat the finest salmon of the season as fast as they can. **THE CITY FATHERS.**

**Lively and Interesting Session of the Council.**

**STRONG PERSONAL REMARKS.**  
 The council convened last evening at 7:40, the mayor and councilmen Bergman, Parker, Elbon, Welch and Fox being present.  
 A liquor license was granted to Phil Bowers, being a renewal of a former license.  
 A petition was received from E. C. Lewis stating that he did not see the order published for the improvement of Madison street, and that the assessment against his lots is \$800.00, which is more than the lots are worth, and asks that the time be extended and he be permitted to improve the street himself. It was referred to councilman Parker.  
 A petition was received from residents of Third street, west of Madison street, asking that the opening or improvement of the same be deferred until next year. The petition was referred to the committee on streets and public works.  
 Communications were received from the chief of police in reference to the collection of warrants for Jackson street sewer and improvements on Polk and Madison streets. They were referred to the chief to collect according to his satisfaction.  
 The chief of police asked for a safe for his office, and the request was referred to the committee on health and police.  
 A communication was received from E. W. Wright, city assessor, inquiring if his bill for sewer to be paid, and was referred to the committee on ways and means.  
 C. H. Stockton, chief engineer, asked for two water pipes east of the Clatsop mill, for fire purposes. It was referred to the committee on fire and water.  
 The committee on ways and means, to whom was referred the request of the city auditor for a type writer, recommended that a type writer be purchased for his use, not to exceed \$70. No action was taken thereon.  
 The committee on streets and public works approved the petition for a sewer on West Sixth street, and recommended that the city attorney draw an ordinance to that effect. The report was adopted.  
 The committee on health and police reported that in their opinion the petition of business men and merchants to have license for their free delivery wagons revoked should not be granted. The committee says that everyone using a team to deliver goods, whether for hire or not, has the free use of the streets and assists in wearing them out, more so in the business portion of the city where the expense of improvement is very large. It is no more than right that they pay a small portion of the expense of such improvement by a license on the vehicles used by them." The report was adopted.  
 Warrants were ordered drawn for work on Water or Third street.  
 The city attorney reported that a street on the plat of McClure, between McClure's and Shively's Astoria, is designated as Mill street. It is 6 feet wide at Water street and 60 feet wide at the southern boundary of Olney's Astoria. He stated that he is informed that the adjoining property owners in Shively's Astoria are in possession of the street, and that it is a part of their property. They have no legal title to it as it belongs to the city. Report received and filed, and city attorney instructed to secure the street for the city.  
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**A HEAVY TRANSFER.**

**Geo. C. Adams, of Boston, Invests in Spokane Real Estate.**  
 HE BUYS 900 ACRES FOR \$165,000.  
 Yesterday a deal in real estate was consummated which transferred \$165,000 of Boston capital to Spokane Falls.  
 About January 1st last, Messrs. J. I. Booge and D. A. McIntosh commenced to buy land adjoining Spokane Falls, on the southeast, near Altamir, and by March 1 had in one body 900 acres. This was bought by them as an investment which they expected to hold until it was needed for residence property, but Spokane was growing too fast for a couple of gentlemen of a speculative turn, and they had only come comfortably into possession of their land when they were offered \$135,000 for it. This would have given them a fair profit, but with the proverbial faith of a Spokane man (which General Clarkson said when here was the making of the whole state) in Spokane real estate, they refused, and were still pursued with offers of \$140,000 and \$150,000 and finally could not resist \$165,000 cash, which they yesterday took from Mr. Geo. C. Adams, a nephew of Charles Francis Adams, president of the Union Pacific railroad, who, it is understood, buys property merely as an investment, he having unbounded faith in this city.  
 The above, clipped from the Spokane Falls Review of the 3rd inst., is of local interest in this city.  
 Mr. D. A. McIntosh was for several years a prominent business man of Astoria, as well as a leader in society circles, and since his residence in Spokane Falls his name has been associated with many of the most important of the enterprises in that city.  
 On this last transaction Mr. McIntosh and his partner will make a clear profit of \$100,000, which is but one of other deals of the same character made by that enterprising firm.  
 Mr. McIntosh visited here last week, and it is understood, made preliminary inquiry relative to investment in Astoria property, which, it is safe to say, would be equal in point of profitable investment to his recent real estate transaction in Spokane Falls.
