A SMOOTH YOUNG SHARPER.

He Raises Twenty Dollars and Gets Into Jail at Portland.

HAS A RECORD IN SEATTLE. Special by THE UNITED PRESS.

PORTLAND, Sept. 4.—W. L. Eppinger, a young man who was partially raised in this city, but a resident of San Francisco for the past few years, arrived here from the Sound a week ago and is now confined in the city jail on a charge of larceny.

The complaining witness is R. D. Freeborn, a wall paper dealer. Mr. Freeborn stated to a reporter that during his absence from the store on Monday last, Eppinger called and represented to an employee that Freeborn had authorized him to borrow \$20.

The money was given him, but when Freeborn heard of the transaction he caused Eppinger's arrest on a charge of larceny. His case is set for hearing to-morrow in the police court.

Since Eppinger's arrest very ugly stories have reached this city regarding his operations in Seattle, where he had been arrested on criminal charge, but allowed to go on his own recognizance. A letter from Seattle received by Mr. Freeborn, which is in possession of a reporter, states that Eppinger's alleged confession operations in that city.

OBJECTION TO THE BLACKLIST. Cummings of New York, on a Question of Privilege. (Special to THE ASTORIAN.)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—In the House Cummings of New York, rising to a question of privilege, protested against his blacklisting by the famous Cannon resolution. The gentleman who introduced the resolution made unjust imputations, and in making these imputations falsified the record and blacklisted himself. He then proceeded to make an attack upon Cannon, comparing the gentleman with the villain of the French revolution. He then proceeded to arraign the Speaker and the majority of the committee on rules. Cummings was frequently interrupted by points of order.

Continuing then proceeded with the arrangement of the speaker, but after frequent interruptions asked the unanimous consent to print the remainder of his remarks in the Record. Consent was refused by Kerr and Blaine.

Cummings then proceeded with his speech, and at the end of the hour was stopped by the gavel of the speaker pro tem, (Burrows).

Blaine, of Missouri, made the point that in speaking to a point of privilege the gentleman was not speaking by the hour-rule. The speaker pro tem. overruled the point and Blaine appealed.

Cannon moved to lay the appeal on the table, and on this motion Cummings yielded to Cannon's motion. Blaine protested that he was entitled to the floor.

Amid applause on the Democratic side, the speaker pro tem recognized Blaine's right to the floor. Blaine yielded to Cummings' motion, understanding a protest from Kerr, the speaker pro tem recognized the gentleman from New York, who proceeded with his speech. He was called to order by the speaker pro tem as not speaking to the point of order. Cummings said: "I may be muzzled temporarily, but all the machinery of the House cannot muzzle me eternally."

CHARGES NOT SUSTAINED. The New York Shipping Commission of Goods Officer. (Special to THE ASTORIAN.)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—The committee of Treasury agents, consisting of George W. Whitehead, W. S. Chance and T. R. Simonon, who were appointed to investigate certain charges preferred against United States Shipping Commissioner Reed, of New York, alleging incompetency and unfitness for office, have made their report to the secretary of the commission.

It is a long and carefully prepared report. The commission reach the conclusion that the charges are not sustained, and express the opinion that Mr. Reed has conscientiously and faithfully administered the laws for the protection of seamen, and that no public interest will be subserved by his removal.

GOING TO THE MOUNTAINS. President Harrison Will Leave Washington To-Day. (Special to THE ASTORIAN.)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—It is the present intention of the president to leave Washington to-morrow for Cresson, Penn. Mrs. Harrison, who arrived here last night will accompany him, as will also Secretary Halford and Miss Sawyer, the president's stenographer. All business of a routine character will be transacted at Congress.

The president will probably remain in the mountains until the 17th inst., when he will go to Toledo to accept an invitation of the Army of the Cumberland, which holds its 21st annual re-union there September 17th and 18th.

Affairs in Guatemala. (Special to THE ASTORIAN.)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—A telegram has been received at the state department from Minister Mizner, of Guatemala, saying that the forces are being rapidly disbanded and that peace will be formally declared next week. He says nothing in regard to the Baorunda incident or reported attacks on himself.

MARINE NEWS AND NOTES.

The steam schooner Augusta, Captain Paul Schrader, sailed for Tillamook yesterday afternoon.

The steamer Alliance, Captain Peterson, will sail for Gray's harbor this morning with about 35 passengers, a large lot of hogs and a general cargo of freight.

The accident to the steamer Telephone was repaired, and yesterday she came down on her regular run, but was two hours late, owing to the late arrival of the Bonita at Portland yesterday morning.

The ship Patricia, Captain Sterling, will be brought alongside the dock to-day, and work will commence transferring part of her cargo to barges, so she can go up the river.

The Columbia discharged fifty-eight tons of freight here and left up the river at four o'clock this morning.

THE FIGURES TELL THE STORY

This Port in Advance of the Sound in the Way of Shipping.

EXCESS IN FAVOR OF ASTORIA.

A comparative statement as to the number of vessels en route to Puget Sound ports and the number bound for this city, shows largely in favor of Astoria.

The San Francisco Commercial News of September 1st lists a total of 34,644 tons headed for the Sound, against 32,169 at the same time last year.

For Astoria the total tonnage is 43,927 at the present time, as against 37,943 tons in 1899.

These figures show an advantage of 9,982 tons in favor of the Columbia river over Puget Sound, or an excess amounting to nearly as many tons as was en route to the Sound in 1899.
