BAY RAILWAY EXTENSION.

Col. Taylor Says We Shall Have a Longer Ride Soon.

The little journey afforded by the Bay railway during these sunny days is a glorious luxury. To go gliding with scarcely a jolt to interrupt one's meditations, out where the wavelets breathe their refreshing exhalations to bathe the heated temples and soothe the restive spirit; to gaze upon the modest bosom of the azure waters, far, far, "where the sunshine and the zephyrs kiss each other," and the scene "combines to bless the mind with peace and softens the soul with sympathy," the pen-picture becomes a reality and its realization is assuredly a glorious privilege.

It was upon the return from one of these exhilarating jaunts that an Astorian reporter observed to Colonel Taylor: "That was a delightful little trip, colonel."

"Yes," said the colonel; "but I intend, soon, to do much better by you people—to give you a good deal longer ride. At no distant day the road will be extended from its southwest terminus, just here, across the bay, and that will depend upon circumstances. Justifiable patronage, assuredly shall never get far in advance of us."

"Our first attention is directed toward the eastern terminus of the road. All that delays us now is the right-of-way across the eastern portion of Mr. Kinney's property. That secured and we should proceed at once. But so far we have no definite agreement; perhaps may never have. In that event we shall change the track far enough back to give us swinging room, and come up Washington street to Second and thence east to the east end of the city. It will require but a short time to complete the road after we get started. This done and the accommodations will be, of course, very much improved. Then, with a considerable extension of the other part of the road, I think there would be no chance for anybody to complain of the amount of ride for the five cents."
