 The Electric will leave for Skipsno to-day at 11 o'clock instead of at 12:30.

 The South Bend base ball club will play a return game with the Astoria at Smith's point next Sunday.
 The Young's river steamer had to make two trips yesterday, so greatly is she taxed by the trade of that section.
 McGowan's plunger, the Rambler, to-day discharged at the Union Pacific dock a carload of salmon to be shipped overland.
 Agent Booth reports the overland passenger traffic to the east is quite lively. He yesterday sold six tickets in a bunch for Morrison, Illinois.
 On account of departure Martin Olsen will sell at public auction all of the household furniture at 461 Jefferson street, next to Allen's paint shop, at 10 o'clock Thursday morning.
 The fish-merchandise is lively business these days, vending his stock of fresh salmon, of which liberal quantities are being taken from the river. People are hungry for the delicate little fishes.
 Reports and alterations in the batteries at Fort Canby are to be made, and Peter J. Gland of the detachment, Vancouver barracks, will be sent down to superintend the work.
 The following attorneys were in attendance at the Circuit court yesterday: C. W. Fulton, G. C. Fulton, Geo. Noland, A. C. Cleveland, J. H. Smith, J. Q. A. Bowley, C. R. Thompson, C. J. Curtis, C. H. Page and P. D. Winton.
 Professors Josephi Bistolfi and Amerigo Montanelli, the celebrated Italian musicians, will probably give another grand concert and ball in the city sometime from the first to two weeks. W. A. Sherman, president of the Terpsichoreans will conduct the arrangements.
 The stone wall around the lot of the Court street school is being built in a substantial manner, and will be a fine work. It is completed on the Court street side, and is well under way on the line of Benton street. When finished it will materially improve the appearance of the grounds.
 Considerable comment is caused in Lane county by a comparison of the delinquent list of 1889 as compared with that of 1888. The delinquent list turned over by the present sheriff amounting to over \$26,000. Some of the taxpayers wish to know wherefore, and charge that unreasonable leniency has been shown.
 Postmaster James W. Hare has received official notice from John Wannamaker, postmaster general, informing him that the money order department must be kept open over 10 a. m. until 6 p. m. This order lengthens the labor of this postoffice three hours and shortens Portland office two hours each day.
 J. Q. A. Bowley and Wiley B. Allen, executors of the estate of the late Louis Wilson give notice to all persons having claims against the estate or against the late firm of Wilson & Fisher, to present them at the office of J. Q. A. Bowley. All persons owing the late firm are notified to make immediate settlement at the same place.
 On the Union Pacific dock there is a tread-mill horse power, which will be used in driving a fodder-cutting machine that accompanies the power. The concern belongs to C. N. Hess. It is evidently the first of its kind ever brought to this section, and many a man puzzled his brain over it yesterday trying to study out what the machine was.
 Yesterday the fine plate glass front was put in the Astoria National Bank building. The plates were three in number, 60x100 inches, the upper part of the front being formed of three plates 48x90 inches. The work of the contractor, Messrs. Jacobs & Plummer, will be finished this week and the bank will open for business next Monday, with A. B. Edee as cashier.
 A very large number of disappointed and disgusted people were present at the dock in Portland on Sunday morning, expecting to come to this city on the Telephone, but the steamer changed her time that day, and did not come, though a notice was put up outside the office on Saturday evening that she would leave as usual on Sunday morning. Profanity was inwardly entertained, and outwardly expressed at the action of the company in this failing to properly notify people.
 Invitations have been received by friends in this city to attend the marriage ceremonies of Geo. H. Tarbell and Miss Monette C. Mattingly, at the Presbyterian church in Mount Vernon, Indiana, on Wednesday, September 17th. George was held in high esteem by his numerous friends who regretted the loss of a genial companion when he removed to the South, where he has been engaged in the real estate and insurance business. In his new venture THE ASTORIAN joins with his many friends in wishing him and his partner the fullest measure of mortal happiness and success.
 An almond-eyed denizen of the land of Confucius, arrayed in gorgeous attire yesterday, created quite a sensation near the post-office and for a long time held an interested party of men, women and children, many of whom belonged to that race whose eyes are

cut on the bias. He was "aliso some Mexican doctor" for he was selling medicine. He had several short iron bars which he would flourish mysteriously, then strike his leg hard until the flesh was all bled and bruised, and would turn "black and blue," then he would take his all-healing preparation, rub it on the bruised limb, and as if by magic, the flesh would resume its natural suifron hue and the swelling would disappear. Of course he sold plenty of the medicine.
 The receipts of the Astoria and South Coast railroad need not be very heavy now to make it a paying concern, for the train is run with but four men, conductor, baggage master, engineer and fireman, and not a station agent or brakeman. The baggage master acts as station agent, ticket seller and freight clerk at each end of the line. In fact he is a veritable Pooch Bah, like the man of many offices in the opera of the Mikado. A considerable number of passengers are carried daily, and the road is doing well.
 A few days ago in the Portland postoffice a watch was found loose in the mail, and the lid of a small box was also found addressed to a young lady in Astoria. Word was sent to Postmaster Hare who instituted inquiry in reference to the matter and discovered that the lost watch belonged to Miss McChesney and yesterday it was restored to her. It had been sent by mail, but not being secured in the box had broken open and the watch had fallen out.
 In the police court yesterday Judge Jewett had two cases before him, both of men who had been too much under the influence of the ardent. Parker, principal; 31 pupils. 2nd grade, Miss Jennie Anderson, teacher; 39 pupils. 3rd grade, Miss Mary Garner, teacher; 33 pupils. 4th grade, Miss Maggie Grant, teacher; 35 pupils. Low primary department, Miss Sophia Gronnell, teacher; 27 pupils.
Big Freight to Frisco.
 The steamship Oregon, Capt. E. Polemann, which arrived from Portland yesterday noon, will sail from this port at 10 a. m. to-day, and carry along an unusually large cargo, aggregating about 300 tons. Upon the list are the following items: Forty-five hundred bundles shooks, 2,300 cases of salmon, 25,000 feet long lumber, 500 bundles lumber, 40 barrels cranberries, 216 sacks of oysters and quantity of miscellaneous freight. It is remarked that considerable salmon is being shipped from Astoria to San Francisco, and this fact seemed to occasion some wonderment in the minds of many. The reason is plain enough. California furnishes a tooth for a good thing as well as the balance of the United States, Great Britain, or any other locality.

In this Astoria the following parent's hearts have strongly entwined.
 Little Paul Worsley who was so terribly burned on Wednesday, August 27th, an account of which appeared in THE ASTORIAN, the following morning, after lingering in pain and suffering intense agony much of the time since then, died yesterday noon at ten minutes after twelve o'clock.
 The lad was four and a half years of age, and since the terrible accident when he was burned while playing in the yard with other children, has lingered in his suffering for nineteen days until death came and set him free.

FOUND DEAD IN A BOAT.
 A Corps Floating Down the Columbia River Towards the Sea.
 Yesterday morning a fishing boat was seen floating past Skamokawa, apparently with no one in it. Parties on the shore went to the boat, and to their horror found the dead body of a man, which proved to be that of Nicholas Spero, who lived on a ranch about ten miles back of Skamokawa. The deceased started down the creek Saturday night, intending to come to Astoria and get some medicine, as he was not feeling well. The deceased was subject to heart disease, and it is supposed dropped dead in the boat. He leaves a wife and two children. He was about 35 years of age and a native of Greece. His funeral will be from Surprenant & Co.'s undertaking parlors at 10:30 this forenoon. The steamer Electric will leave Wilson & Fisher's wharf with the funeral procession for Clatsop cemetery, where the interment will take place.

THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.
Numerous Communications Received And Acted Upon.
THE COMMITTEES APPOINTED.
 The regular meeting of the Chamber was held last evening, President Bowly in the chair. In the absence of the secretary, Samuel Elmore was appointed as secretary pro tem.
 Bill of Occident hotel for meals and refreshments to visitors from the Portland chamber was read and ordered paid.
 Capt. Gray proposed for membership J. H. Johansen, and he was elected.
 The committee in reference to securing contracts from merchants and business men to give their freight for three years to the first railroad building here, made report of progress and asked for further time, which was granted.
 E. A. Weed, of the special committee, to whom was referred the communication from J. W. Stengle in reference to views of Astoria, reported that the committee believed the purchase of several thousand of those views, and their circulation would be of great benefit to Astoria, but offered no recommendation to the Chamber to purchase them, as no funds are on hand applicable for that purpose. The report was received.
 Several communications were read. J. W. Welch moved that 1,000 copies of the editorial of H. W. Scott in the Oregonian of Sept. 15 be printed. Capt. Gray amended that the matter be referred to a committee of three to have this and other articles printed together for general circulation. Motion was amended prevailed, and the chair appointed Capt. Gray, A. R. Cyrus and Major Weed as the committee.
 The Chamber of Commerce asks the influence of this chamber to leave present amount of freight and mail service of the Pacific subdivided and more superintendents appointed. Referred to President Bowly.
 Smith & Johnson, general railway contractors ask for information in reference to amount of freight received and sent here, with a view of assisting in securing construction of a railroad to Astoria. Referred to president and secretary.
 A request of the City Council asking for a committee of three to act in conjunction with mayor and city engineer in preparing a new charter for Astoria, was received. It was moved by E. A. Weed that a committee be appointed by the president, and the motion was carried.
 An invitation was received from the Portland Chamber of Commerce inviting delegates to aid in forming a State Board of Trade. On motion of E. A. Weed it was voted that two delegates be appointed to attend the convention of delegates in Portland Sept. 27.
 A communication from Charles H. Dodd, of Portland, was read, urging this Chamber to help the movement demanding a recount for the whole state for the present census. On motion of James W. Welch it was voted that the president and secretary accede to the request and telegraph our assent to Portland Chamber of Commerce in Congress.
 Moved by Capt. Gray that the secretary be requested to write to Major Handbury asking when the telegraph cable to Tillamook Rock will be completed. Carried.
 On motion of A. R. Cyrus the present committee on views of Astoria were authorized to devise means to purchase the views.
 Moved by Capt. Gray that the President appoint a committee to devise ways and means towards assisting in the development of natural gas at Warrenton or vicinity. Carried.

Messrs. Sharpstein and Belding have placed in the hands of Messrs. Thompson & Robb, of the committee, \$200, to be paid into the public library, and the granting of the franchise, they do not comply with the terms of their contracts and build or cause to be built the electric cable road. There were several thousand dollars to be raised, and now let those who have objected that the projectors did not mean business come to the front and show that they can meet fairness with fairness and enterprise with enterprise. Should the matter not be settled at an early date, Mr. Sharpstein asserts that he will abandon the matter entirely, and no citizen can well say he is not fully justified in doing so.
