Among the standing committees of the state board of commerce recently appointed by President Osborn, the following Astorians are assigned to places: Samuel Elmore, chairman of the committee on foreign trade and commerce; M. J. Kinney, on coast commerce; David Morgan, river and harbor improvements; and F. C. Reed is chairman of the committee on fisheries. On the important committee of the world's Columbian exposition, not a single person is named from Astoria, though there are fifteen members, one each being taken from the following towns: Portland, Baker City, Grant's Pass, Marshfield, Corvallis, The Dalles, Albany, La Grande, Pendleton, Salem, Eugene, McMinnville, Roseburg, Vernonia and Toledo. Why was Astoria ignored?

EARNEST and active work is being done in nearly all the states except Oregon, towards preparing for the Chicago fair, and an editorial in the Chicago Herald so ably and efficiently refers to the matter that it is copied as follows: "During the coming winter the legislatures of no less than thirty-two states will assemble in November and others in December, but most of them will not sit until January. In the case of many of them the coming session will be the only opportunity that they will have to pass upon the subject of appropriating money for a state exhibit at the Columbian exposition in Chicago in 1903. What are the world's fair managers doing toward the proper presentation of the claims of the international exposition upon them. The importance of prompt action cannot be overestimated. Every legislature should be visited and addressed by representatives of the fair and an earnest effort should be made in all cases to secure a generous appropriation. There is every reason to believe that the people of all the states are well disposed toward the world's fair and that they are anxious to have the various commonwealths appropriately represented, but there is danger in delay, and it should be the first duty of the managers to speak in time with relation to so important a subject."

A Teaching Scene Witnessed by a Portland Gentleman. One week ago we received an invitation to witness an delicate surgical operation on an eye. The patient was the 17-year-old daughter of Harrison Hay. For three years she had been blind in both eyes with a cataract, and was obliged to grope her way about in total darkness.
