TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

Wisconsin is in doubt. The Democrats carried Alabama. Five men were executed in Havana. At 2 a. m. both parties claim Pennsylvania.

President Harrison voted at Indianapolis. The Republicans claim Ohio for McKinley. Florida goes democratic by about 15,000 majority.

McKinley's district returns him with big republican gains. Large democratic gains are reported from North Carolina.

Lapham, Dem., is elected in the First Rhode Island district. Olympia got the majority for the capital site in Washington.

It is estimated that the democrats gained 1,000 in Tennessee. The Philadelphia Inquirer concedes the election of Patterson.

The republican state central committee claims California by 7,000. Russell, Dem., is indicated as elected governor by 5,000 plurality.

At 1:30 o'clock this morning the republicans claim Minnesota. The Fourth Congressional district in Maryland elected a democrat.

Grant is elected mayor of New York and Tammany carried the day. The republicans claim Iowa and all the congressional districts except one.

It is conceded that Dr. C. C. O'Donnell is elected mayor of San Francisco. Cairo, the morning, was re-elected from Utah, over Goodwin, liberal.

Ten of the eleven congressional districts in Kentucky went democratic. The election of Cox, Dem., in Seventeenth New York district is conceded.

The steamer S. C. Reynolds went on a reef near Toledo, Ohio, and caught fire. The republicans of Minnesota claim the election of Potter for mayor by 900.

Georgia will send a solid democratic congressional delegation to Washington. One hundred and fourteen towns in Connecticut give the democrats a gain of 991.

George Whiteley, aged 17 years, fell from a wagon in Portland and broke his neck. Eighty-four districts in Michigan give the democratic candidate for governor a majority.

A special to the Chicago Herald says Indiana has gone democratic by 23,000 majority. The chairman of the Illinois republican state central committee claims the re-election.

At Richmond, Va., two men were killed and another seriously wounded; trouble over the election. The election in the white districts in Arkansas, excepting for a shooting scrape caused by a colored deputy sheriff were quiet.

McKinley was returned from his own district with a big majority and Ohio is claimed by the republicans with 29,000 majority. Tillman, the farmer's alliance and democratic candidate was elected governor of South Carolina; there was no trouble between the races.

The republicans have a majority in Kansas, carrying eight against six counties secured by the democrats, out of nineteen heard from, five going for the alliance.

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THE ELECTIONS

Democratic Gains Made In Several States.

McKINLEY IS ALL RIGHT.

California Gives a Big Republican Majority.

MASSACHUSETTS FALLS DOWN.

Latest Returns From All the Election Districts.

TAMMANY CARRIES NEW YORK.

Alabama.

MONTGOMERY, Nov. 4.—Scattering returns received are sufficient to show that the republican ticket is elected in this state. The farmers' alliance men did not vote for the independents except to a very limited extent.

Arkansas. LITTLE ROCK, Nov. 4.—With a single exception of trouble at Pine Bluff, where a negro deputy sheriff fatally wounded a policeman named Laming and shot two more, all the white election districts in Arkansas were quiet.

California. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—The republican state central committee claim the state by 7,000 majority, and say that Markham is running way ahead in the southern part of the state.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5, 1 A. M.—Partial returns from Alameda, Fresno, Kern, Los Angeles, San Joaquin, Santa Clara, Stanislaus, Plumas, Butte, Colusa, Nevada, Placer, Yuba, Yolo, Merced, Contra Costa, Solano and San Francisco counties give the following: Markham, 33,723; Pond, 34,908. But thirty-five precincts remain to be heard from in San Francisco.

Connecticut. HARTFORD, Nov. 4.—One hundred and fourteen towns give the state a net gain of 991.

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 4.—Ten towns show a net democratic gain on the state ticket of 698 and a democratic gain of five in the legislature.

MERIDEN, Nov. 4, 11 P. M.—Over one hundred towns show a loss of two legislators to the Republicans and as they have sixty-six on joint ballot, it cannot now be changed, so that Carl Platt is expected to be his own successor in the United States senate.

HARTFORD, Nov. 5, 1 A. M.—The house is probably Republican by forty-five majority, with nineteen towns to hear from. The senate is Democratic by four majority.

Florida. JACKSONVILLE, Nov. 4.—Returns from seventy towns received by the Times-Union show nearly 1,000 republican loss. The democrats carry the state by about 15,000 majority.

JACKSONVILLE, Nov. 4.—The democratic state ticket, it is estimated, is elected by over 15,000. Both democratic congressmen were elected by largely increased majorities.

Georgia. ATLANTA, Nov. 4.—Georgia will send a solid democratic congressional delegation. The canvass in the Seventh district was close and resulted in Everett's, Dem., election, over Felton, Ind. Dem., by a small majority.

Illinois. CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—The chairman of the republican state central committee claims the re-election of all the republican congressmen.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—LATER.—Both the republican and democratic state central committees say they are unable to give estimates from the returns. Those coming in indicate democratic gains over the state election held in September last. The democrats claim the election of all congressmen including Brockenridge in the Second district.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4, 2:30 A. M.—The democratic state central committee claims that they have certainly gained three congressmen and probably five, and that they have carried the state with a good majority.

Indiana. CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—A special to the Herald from Indianapolis states that Indiana has gone Democratic by 20,000 and that one democratic congressman has been gained.

Iowa. DES MOINES, Nov. 5.—The republican state central committee claim the state by 5,000 majority, and all the congressional districts except the First.

Kansas. TOPEKA, Nov. 4.—Returns from nineteen counties indicate that eight have gone republican, six democratic and five for the alliance.

Kentucky. LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 4.—It is reasonably certain that out of eleven congressional districts in Kentucky, ten have gone democratic by increased majorities.

Maryland. BALTIMORE, Nov. 4.—The Fourth Congressional district complete, gives Baynor, Dem., 18,780; Goldsborough, Rep., 12,240.

Massachusetts. BOSTON, Nov. 4.—Seventy-five towns of Massachusetts and 200 out of 205 precincts in Boston give for governor: Blackmer, Pro., 3,058; Brackett, Rep., 33,963; Russell, Dem., 44,250. Russell's plurality is 10,888. If Russell continues to gain on Brackett in the state outside of Boston as he has in the city, and all indications at this hour point that way, he is elected by 5,000 majority.

BOSTON, Nov. 4.—Indications are at 10 P. M. that Russell is elected governor by 5,000 majority.

BOSTON, Nov. 4.—From gains on the vote so far the indications are that the republican state central committee will be elected by 5,000 plurality. The democrats have gained two congressmen.

BOSTON, Nov. 5, 2:30 A. M.—The republicans concede Russell's election by about 7,000 plurality.

BOSTON, Nov. 4.—Boston for governor, gives Russell, Dem., 32,896; Brackett, Rep., 19,876; Blackmer, Pro., 1,564; Russell's plurality is 13,020. The vote last year was Russell, 28,280; Brackett, 22,580; Blackmer, 1,536; Russell's plurality, 1,545. The democrats claim the state by a plurality. The republican committee concedes Russell's election, although they will not name the figures.

BOSTON, Nov. 4.—One hundred and fourteen towns in New Hampshire show a democratic gain of twenty-two members of the legislature and indications point to the election of Amson, Dem., for governor.

Michigan. DETROIT, Nov. 4.—Eighty-four districts, including twenty-four in this city, give Turner, Rep., for governor, 8,744; Winans, Dem., 9,807.

Minnesota. MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 4.—It is pretty certain that Merriam, Rep., for governor, has fallen considerably below his ticket. The republicans claim the election of Potter for mayor by 900.

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 5, 1:30 A. M.—The republican state central committee claim the state by a gain of 885. This makes McKinley's gain 848 in 14 of the 64 precincts in Stark county, which went 1,100 for Campbell last year. One precinct heard from in Medina county gives McKinley a gain of 122.

MISSOURI. ST. LOUIS, Nov. 4.—It is claimed that John O'Neil, Dem., is elected to congress by 1,000 in the 11th district, which two years ago gave a republican majority of 3,000.

Montana. HELENA, Nov. 4.—Ex-Governor White, chairman of the republican committee, expresses confidence in the election of Carter and a majority of the republican state senators. His claim is based on all advice from Butte, Missouri, and other prominent towns west of the range in Dixon's part of the state.

North Carolina. RALEIGH, Nov. 4.—Indications are that the democrats will carry the state by 40,000. Large democratic gains are reported in the congressional vote in the Third, Fourth, Fifth and Ninth districts, and democratic gains in the legislative ticket are steadily increasing.

New Hampshire. CONCORD, Nov. 4.—The democratic gain in 114 towns is over 1,200, and Amson, Dem., is probably elected, and the legislature is probably democratic, insuring the election of a democrat to succeed United States Senator Blair.

New York. NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The daily News says McKinley is probably defeated. The State says he is defeated by 1,000. The Tribune claims his election by 600.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Returns received indicate the election of the entire Tammany ticket by a majority of from 15,000 to 20,000.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Thirty-two election districts out of 947 in the great Grant Dem. for mayor 35,150; Scott Fusion, 28,173. It is thought that Grant's majority will exceed 15,000.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Nov. 4.—King's county congressional candidates elect are probably Boody, Dem., in the Second district, Wallace, Rep., in the Third district, Clancy, Dem., in the Fourth and Magner, Dem., in the Fifth.

KINGS TOWNS, Nov. 4.—The election of Cox, Dem., for congress in the Seventh district is conceded by the republicans by a majority of 750.

Dan Lockwood, who nominated Cleveland for mayor, governor and president, has carried the Thirty-second congressional district and is probably elected.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Tammany Hall has gained a decisive victory over the republican and county democratic fusion. Grant for mayor, is not likely to fall back of 22,000 majority over Scott.

The vote for district attorney, in which it was expected that Nicholas, the Tammany nominee, would be far behind the vote for Grant, will show that he has a majority of nearly 21,000 over Goff, the fusion candidate.

All the Tammany candidates for the other county officers, namely: Sheriff, president of the board of aldermen and county clerk, have average majorities of 20,000. The vote for superior court judges and county judges shows the same majority in favor of Tammany. In the city over 200,000 votes were cast out of a registration of 245,000. The county officers elected are the Tammany nominees: Grant, mayor; Corman, sheriff; Geiswich, county clerk; Arnold, president of the board of aldermen. The democrats carried over congressional district in the city.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Eleven P. M. Returns so far as received, give the following congressmen as reasonably certain: First district, Cover, Dem.; Second, Boody, Dem.; Third, Waller, Rep.; Fourth, Clancy, Dem.; Fifth, Wagner, Dem.; Sixth, Fellows, Dem.; Seventh, Dumphy, Dem.; Eighth, Campbell, Dem.; Ninth, Cummings, Dem.; Tenth, Spinola, Dem.; Eleventh, Wether, Dem.

The democrats also made a decisive victory in the assembly. Those elected, with five exceptions, are Tammany nominees. All the successful candidates in the Fourth, Sixth, Tenth and Twenty-second districts are democrats, elected on the Fusion ticket. Tammany's victories for members of the board of aldermen are in the same proportion as those for the assembly.

KINGSTON, Nov. 4.—Cox, Dem., in the Sixteenth congressional district has 800 or more majority.

LATER.—The Legislature is Democratic on a joint ballot insuring the election of a Democrat to succeed Everts.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The World's bulletin claims Democratic victory in Connecticut with congressional gains.

A Boston dispatch to the Herald, states that six Democratic congressmen are probably elected. A gain of four.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 4.—It is thought that Major McKinley is defeated.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 4.—Two private telegrams have just been received at the republican headquarters, which, if true, insure the election of Major Wm. McKinley. One of the telegrams states that Wayne county gives McKinley 900 majority, which shows a change of 1,800 votes in his favor. The other dispatch states that in fourteen precincts of Stark county McKinley's home, he made a gain of 846 votes. This information has never been contradicted nor verified by the official returns.

CANTON, Nov. 4.—McKinley's own ward committee gives a gain of 885. This makes McKinley's gain 848 in 14 of the 64 precincts in Stark county, which went 1,100 for Campbell last year. One precinct heard from in Medina county gives McKinley a gain of 122.

COLUMBUS, Nov. 4.—Early returns from nearly every section in the state indicate a republican victory by majorities ranging from 5,000 to 20,00
