The American Committee Want

No Relief.

cial to THE ASTORIAN. New York, Nov. 9.—The American ommittee for relief in Ireland has ssued a statement announcing the temporary withdrawal of its appeal to the American people. At the time the appeal was issued the committee says there was no reason for believing that the distress which would follow the failure of the posito crop in Ire-land would be relieved, otherwise than by American generosity.

No steps having been taken by the

British government to meet the crisis, the first effort of action of the American committee was to provoke flippant denials from the government press that distress existed or that famine was threatened. Nevertheless developments of the last month have confirmed the committee's warning and the British government has been another in her neck and her husband another in her neck and her husband spurred to investigate the situation and undertake a system of public works in the distressed districts, which by partial relief will at least postpone the threatened famine
