R. M. Leathers "proved up" on a pre-emption claim in section 33, township 7 north, range 8 west.

Martin Olsen, the steamship agent, received instructions yesterday to sell round trip tickets to and from Astoria and all Scandinavian points for \$118.

Two mortgages amounting to \$8,250 were yesterday filed with the county recorder for record, also a release of a bond from E. J. Ford et al. to Rachel and B. C. Kindred.

E. C. Holden who has been in correspondence, states that it is not certain that a pastor from Marysville, Cal., has been secured for the Presbyterian church of this city.

Sheriff Smith returned from Portland yesterday. He corroborated the story of his arrest and discharge at the instance of the "Bunko" Kelly crowd, as has been detailed in THE ASTORIAN.

A chimney fire in the residence of A. G. Allen, on Cedar street between West Seventh and West Eighth streets, at 7 o'clock last evening called out the fire department and the new engine had its first run. The loss was nominal.

All the electric lights in our office suddenly stopped last evening soon after 9 o'clock, but word was sent to the electric light works, and in a few minutes the incandescents were all right. It was only a slight trouble caused by the slipping of a wire, and was quickly fixed.

The South Bend Journal says that the government steamer Gedney has run up to November 1st, 1890 making 10,000 soundings. The total record to date on Willapa bay and harbor shows 725 miles of soundings run, or 38,000 actual soundings taken.

Union Pacific Ticket Agent Bozorth has been notified of an increase in the second class passenger rate to Chicago. Hereafter pasteborders to Chicago will cost \$4.50 an increase of \$2.50. The raise is on the lines between the Missouri river and Chicago and is the result of the breaking of the traffic agreement between the Union Pacific and connecting lines, particulars in regard to which have been published in THE ASTORIAN.

Reserved seats are being taken rapidly for the play of "Hearts of Oak," which is to be produced at the opera house to-morrow evening by the talented actor James A. Herne, and his splendid company. It is an admirable piece, for the plot is earnest and prominently presented. It has been before the public for twelve years and this is a sure guaranty of merit. The little child who takes a leading part is also a strong attraction, and wins the love of all who see her.

Last Monday morning a lead colored skiff about eighteen feet long was found floating bottomside up a little below Clifton. Underneath was a package of finest smoking tobacco, four pounds in weight, a half bottle of whiskey, a gallon jug nearly full of whiskey, a broken oar, two oarlocks, five English books, and one letter that could not be deciphered. It is supposed the occupant of the boat may have been drowned. The boat was left at Clifton by Ostrom who picked it up.

China Charley, the vegetable gardener at Smith's point is in sore distress, and a few days ago he unfolded a tale of woe to Attorney George Noland that brought tears to the eyes of the barrister. The cause of Charley's troubles, to judge from the attorney's story, is manifold and the pagan made fire threat to fill up on opium and pine tar and go to the residence of a prominent citizen on the hill and die. The coroner thinks there is something in the threat and is watching the house.

Last evening occurred at their armory, the quarterly inspection of Company H, by First Lieut. D. J. Moore, signal officer on the staff of Col. Beebe, commanding the 1st Regiment, O. N. G. The attendance was light, owing to the large number of men now absent from the city, as the company has forty-six members at present, having recently received a number of recruits. The inspecting officer expressed himself as being well pleased with the appearance, and complimented the men on their proficiency in drill.

Considerable excitement was occasioned on the steamer Bonita yesterday morning, and Chief of Police Barry was sent for. It proved to be a case of much ado about nothing. A Portuguese who had in his charge a twelve year old girl had purchased what he supposed was two staterooms, one for the child and one for himself. Owing to the fact that the man was unable to speak English a mistake was made and when the officers of the steamer found that he had only one stateroom for himself and the girl they objected to his going into the room. The foreigner did not understand and as a result a row occurred. Chief Barry straightened the matter out and another room was furnished the man.

THE ONLY RESTAURANT—JEFF'S

A FORGER CAUGHT IN THE ACT Tried to Pass Bogus Checks in the City Yesterday.

NOW IN THE CITY PRISON.

A dapper looking young fellow who for several months past had worked as a waiter in various restaurants and hotels at South Bend is locked up in the city prison on several charges of forgery. He gives his name as George F. Christensen and arrived here last Tuesday evening. Almost immediately after his arrival he put into circulation a couple of spurious checks for small amounts, and just before Chief of Police Barry and Officer McCarthy arrested him, he tried to cash a check for \$100 cashed at the First National Bank. Cashier Gordon of that institution suspected all was not right and a little investigation convinced him of the fact. When Christensen, who is a very crude worker in the field of forgery, put in an appearance at the bank he was accompanied by another young fellow, who it is thought was a confederate, but no trace of this individual can be found by the police, and the prisoner refuses to say who he is.

On being searched at the city prison a couple of checks were found on him together with \$5 in money. Christensen spent the money he realized in clothing, and when arrested was attired in a brand new suit. One of the fellow's victims is S. B. Dyer of Knappa, who cashed a check drawn on the bank of Hoquiam and purporting to be signed by S. H. Bell of South Bend. The check he tried to cash at the First National bank in this city, was also signed with the name of Bell. It was made payable to Dyer, and purported to have been endorsed by that gentleman. Captain Parker, master of the steamer Gen. Canby, loses a few dollars through the chp as he gave him an advance on a check for \$50 drawn on the First National bank of Tacoma, and purporting to be signed by J. Wilson. Another check Christensen had was drawn on the Hoquiam bank in favor of J. Brown and signed S. H. Bell.

The prisoner made full confession and said that if he didn't get more than ten years in the penitentiary he didn't care.

A Former Astoria Boy Heard From.

He is now a law student in Oakland, and is taking lessons in elocution from Prof. Watson, the famous elocutionist. ANOTHER NIGHT BOAT. Report that the "Harvest Queen" Will be Put on the Night Run.

It is promised that the long looked for extra boat for night service on the river will be put on the run commencing Friday night, November 21st, and that on that evening the steamer Harvest Queen will leave Portland and thereafter will make the night run with the steamer Thompson, the steamers leaving each city alternate nights. At the Union Pacific office in this city no verification of the report could be obtained, General Agent Noyes stating that he knew nothing about the matter other than what he had heard on the outside; the company had issued no circulars in regard thereto, the only object in putting on another night boat would be to handle heavy lighterage that is expected down the river during the next few months.
