Our buildings have been numbered, the district boundaries have been marked out and the necessary documents forwarded to Washington, and when Deacon Wannamaker's assistants have completed the circle of red tape requirements, we shall probably hear something in reference to the letter carriers for Astoria.

Talk about potatoes! How is this for a claim from Del Norte, Cal., where it is said that from one acre the yield of potatoes was 50,522 pounds? There were fifty rows, and the spuds were of the Boreley prolific variety, having originally come from California. Fourteen men, aided by a Hoover potato digger, were four days employed in digging and sacking the yield of this one acre. That is a product worth mentioning, and who can exceed it?

Rapidly is the year drawing to a close, and but little over five weeks of 1890 are yet to come. The hopes of a railroad for Astoria being commenced this year show but little signs of fruition, yet we can almost hear the rattle of trains approaching more fortunate, though less favorable localities. Shall we wait for ever, and never see the completion of a railroad for this town? Every business enterprise now almost dormant, would spring into active vitality if there was any prospect of a speedy commencement of work on the construction of a road.

A Touching Scene Witnessed by a Portland  
Gentleman.

One week ago we received an invitation to witness a delicate surgical operation on an eye. The patient was the 17-year-old daughter of Harrison Hay. For three years she had been blind in both eyes with a cataract, and was obliged to creep her way about in total darkness. The patient, without taking chloroform, submitted to the following operation: She was now ready for the surgical part of the work, and we stood in breathless anxiety as Dr. Prentice placed the point of his knife at the side of the eye, carefully touched the point of the cornea, then the blade entered the eye; we saw it pass through the eye in front of the pupil and then come out at the opposite side. It was then drawn upward, and a cut made of about one-third of the circumference of the ball. Another instrument was then passed in back of the pupil, and almost on the instant the girl said: "Oh, Dr. Prentice, I can see you." This was spoken in tones well calculated to bring tears to one's eyes. From the time the knife touched the eye until the patient could see, it was just one minute. She was allowed to see those about her for a moment, then the eye was closed and bandaged.

In just one week after the operation she came into our office and was able to read our paper. She also wrote a letter to me, saying: "Dear parents, I can see and am happy."
