ESTIMATES at Washington carefully compiled, show that the political standing of the house of representatives in the fifty-second congress will be 223 democrats, 92 republicans and seventeen farmers' alliance. On a straight ballot this would give the democrats 130 more votes than the republicans, but as of the seventeen alliance men twelve are from the South and would probably vote with the democrats, this would give the latter 142 over the republicans, or 134 majority over the republicans and the other five alliance men. Dark picture for the G. O. P. is it not?

**A Touching Scene Witnessed by a Portland Gentleman.** One week ago we received an invitation to witness a delicate surgical operation on an eye. The patient was the 17-year-old daughter of Harrison Hay. For three years she had been blind in her right eye, and had been obliged to grope her way about in total darkness. The patient, without taking chloroform, submitted to the following operation: She was now ready for the surgical part of the work, and we stood in breathless anxiety as Dr. Prentice placed the point of his knife at the side of the cornea, carefully touched the point of the cornea, then the blade entered the eye; we saw it pass through the eye in front of the pupil and then come out at the opposite side. It was then drawn upward, and a cut made of about one-third of the circumference of the ball. Another instrument was then passed in front of the pupil, and almost on the instant the girl said: "Oh, Dr. Prentice, I can see you!" This was spoken in tones well calculated to bring tears to one's eyes. From the time the knife touched the eye until the patient could see, it was just one minute.
