## TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

The Indian scare in Dakota is subsiding. Thomas Favost & Sons, of Pittsburg, failed. August Belmont, the famous New York banker, died yesterday. The dead body of a supposed robber was found near Tacoma. The stock market in New York was yesterday again yesterday. Count Julius Karoly, a Hungarian statesman, died yesterday. Guatemala has placed an export duty on silver of \$1.84 per pound. An Indian was run over by the cars at Tacoma and instantly killed. Mrs. J. E. Alsop, of Tacoma, was killed by a runaway team at Tacoma. The village of Akron, N. Y., was destroyed by fire; no particulars. Extensive floods and hurricanes are reported in Austria and Germany. The Danish schooner *Regina* was sunk in a collision; five lives were lost. The first through train for Anacortes will leave Tacoma this morning. The census of Brooklyn, N. Y., shown by returns of the police is 855,845. Edward Brandon, a prominent Wall Street broker, suspended yesterday. A Tacoma paper urges the opening of the Payallup reservation to white settlers. A fierce storm is raging along the British coast; a number of disasters are reported. Colonel John R. Baker, a prominent stock operator of Devon, Penn., has disappeared. A daring young thief in Tacoma snatched a purse from a lady's hand, but was captured. The trainmen of the St. Louis branch of the Chicago and Eastern Illinois railroad have struck. It is reported that the Oregon Improvement company will go into the hands of a receiver to-day. Dr. A. M. Turner, a prominent citizen and politician at Falkville, Ala., killed his wife and child. A dynamite cartridge caused the death of two men and the serious injury to two others in New York. The British steamship *Calyppo* foundered at sea, having been in collision; the crew was saved. The strike on the Chicago and Eastern Illinois railroad has caused a freight blockade at Terre Haute. General Denby, minister to China, is again spoken of as a probable democratic candidate for the vice presidency. More trouble with the Chinese laborers who were defrauded out of their money in San Francisco is expected. A candidate for the United States senate in Arkansas proposes to an opponent to settle the matter by popular vote. The London home rule paper in London announces that Parnell will surrender the leadership of the Irish nationalists. The report that work on the Gray's Harbor and Willapa Harbor extension of the Northern Pacific is to stop, is denied in Tacoma. Fifty thousand dollars of the \$100,000 necessary to purchase terminal grounds for the Union Pacific at Tacoma has been subscribed. The cashier of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railroad at Peoria, Ill., has been arrested for embezzlement; shortage \$18,000. An investigation of the affairs of the Midland Mercantile Company, of Kansas City, led the manager, Charles Comstock, to commit suicide; the shortage was \$8,000.

## THE POLITICAL ARENA

**General Denby Mentioned for Second Place in 1892.**  
A CANDIDATE'S PROPOSITION.  
He Wants to Go to the United States Senate From Arkansas by A Popular Vote.  
SPECIAL BY THE UNITED PRESS.  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—There is the best authority for the statement that General Denby, minister to China, will not be removed by the present administration. He is not only a personal friend of President Harrison, the intimacy extending to the families of both men, but he represents the best elements of independent democracy. The president realizes that he would make more enemies by removing General Denby than he would secure friends. There is an undercurrent of considerable strength among democratic leaders in favor of General Denby for the vice president's place on the ticket in 1892. They say he was a brave and brilliant soldier; that he has made no antagonisms and would command the vote of every man who believed in the principles of the democratic party.

**Several Disasters at Sea.**  
A Fierce Storm Raging Along the British Coast.  
A NUMBER OF VESSELS LOST.  
SPECIAL BY THE UNITED PRESS.  
LONDON, Nov. 24.—There is no abatement in the fury of the storm prevailing in the English Channel and elsewhere along the British coast. Numerous wrecks and collisions are reported. At Hartland the British steamer *Uppingham*, from Cardiff for Port Said, is ashore. Twenty-one persons have been taken off, but the first officer drowned and a boat containing five of the crew is missing. The Danish schooner *Regina* has been sunk in a collision with the steamer *Primrose*. Five of the schooner's crew were drowned. The steamer *Princess*, from Copenhagen, is reported to have been wrecked. The British steamship *Calyppo*, from Mediterranean ports, foundered off Sandgate after being in a collision. The crew has arrived at Folkestone. The collision occurred last night with another vessel, a Spanish steamer. It is supposed that the Spaniard also foundered.

**Mysterious Disappearance of a Stock Operator.**

A Physician Murders His Wife and Daughter.

He declared that his wife had tried to kill him and that he acted in self-defense throughout.

**DEATH OF AUGUST BELMONT.**  
The Famous Banker Dies in New York City.

He contracted a cold, which developed into pneumonia, and died while attending a recent horse show. The banking house of August Belmont & Co. was closed this morning, and on the door was posted the following: "Closed on account of the death of Mr. Belmont." ## MONEY ON BLOOD.

**Defrauded Chinese Laborers Threaten Trouble.**

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 24.—It was supposed that the trouble between the two hundred and fifty Chinese, who worked during the past season in Alaska canneries and who were defrauded out of their earnings, and several Chinese firms had been settled, but such is not the case and more trouble is liable to take place at any time. A meeting of the Chinese seven companies was held yesterday, but nothing definite was decided upon. The laborers are clamoring for their money and threaten to loot several stores and kill those who oppose them. It is said that the seven companies are trying to raise funds by subscription to quiet the men but contributions are coming in slowly.

**HIS ACCOUNTS SHORT.**

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 24.—For some days past an investigation of the affairs of the Midland Mercantile Company, has been going on. The company was organized only two months ago, but in that time there has been an shortage of over \$8,000. The investigation came to a close to-night. Charles Comstock, the business manager, yesterday afternoon, went to his home on Woods' farm and took a dose of laudanum, dying this morning.

The act was daring owing to the fact that the purse was packed with people, as it was the noon hour.

**THE NOTORIOUS WHITFIELDS.**  
"Doc" Arrested in California for Assault to Murder.  
HIS BROTHERS' ACCOMPLICES  
The Whitfield brothers, who recently achieved fame here, and narrowly escaped being sent to state prison for robbing the cabins of settlers, along the Lewis and Clarke river section, have been heard from again. It is time they are in trouble at Oakland, Cal. Details in regard to the case are merged as the brothers were only arrested yesterday. Last night Chief of Police Barry received a dispatch stating that C. S. alias "Doc" Whitfield, had been arrested in Alameda for robbery and assault to murder, and that L. S. alias Bute, and E. W. alias Fred Whitfield, his brothers were in custody as accessories. The weapon used was a sand-bag and the California authorities feared that they cannot make the charge stick against the two last named, desired to know if the brothers were wanted here. Chief Barry wired in such a manner as will enable the California officers to hold the men long enough for them to complete the working up of the case against them. The brothers are notorious crooks and a strong suspicion exists that they were implicated in the murder of Crosby of Tacoma.

**MARINE NEWS AND NOTES.**  
The British bark *Birker* and *Ochertrey* left for the river yesterday. The steam schooner *Alliance* arrived in from Gray's Harbor yesterday. The British ship *City of Carlisle* cleared for the United Kingdom yesterday. She is four laden. The steamer *R. P. Elmore* blew its whistle about 7 o'clock last evening. She is from Tillamook with a cargo of salmon. The steamship *Columbia* arrived in from San Francisco yesterday morning with a large passenger list and the usual freight list. The steamship *Oregon* arrived down from Portland on time yesterday and sailed for San Francisco with the usual consignment of oysters, shoeks, etc.

HIS BROTHERS' ACCOMPLICES  
The Whitfield brothers, who recently achieved fame here, and narrowly escaped being sent to state prison for robbing the cabins of settlers, along the Lewis and Clarke river section, have been heard from again. It is time they are in trouble at Oakland, Cal. Details in regard to the case are merged as the brothers were only arrested yesterday. Chief Barry wired in such a manner as will enable the California officers to hold the men long enough for them to complete the working up of the case against them. The brothers are notorious crooks and a strong suspicion exists that they were implicated in the murder of Crosby of Tacoma.
