GRATEFUL RECOGNITION.

Banquet to Elbert Rappleye, The Canoe Voyager.

SUPPER, SPEECHES, TOASTS.

Last evening after the session of the chamber of commerce, a committee of that body and a number of other gentlemen assembled around a large dining table at Becker's restaurant and had a delightfully social time for a couple of hours.

Those present were G. Wingate, Capt. J. H. D. Gray, as the committee, J. F. Halloran, vice-president of the chamber, H. C. Thompson, representing the merchants, Ed. Wright and E. A. Weed, representing the press, and Elbert Rappleye, of the New York Mail and Express, in whose honor the party had assembled.

Dysters were served in various styles, and for drink there was tea, coffee, and other good things, including the best that the city could furnish.

After many of the solids and some of the liquids had disappeared, G. Wingate as chairman of the committee and the occasion, arose, and in a neat speech most cordially congratulated the guest on the success of his long and laborious voyage, over much of which he had followed the course of the Lewis and Clarke expedition 85 years before, welcomed him to the hospitable shores of Astoria and through him tendered the thanks of the city to the proprietors of the Mail and Express, for their efforts in sending a reporter here over such an eventful route.

In conclusion, he proposed the health of the visitor, which was drunk, and Mr. Rappleye responded appropriately, thanking the gentlemen for the honor conferred and in the name of his paper accepting the courtesies tendered so kindly and heartily.

Observing that of all his many and varied experiences on the long trip of nearly eight months the kind reception awarded him by the people of Astoria was the most agreeable event to cherish in memory.

The chairman proposed as a toast, "The Press," and called upon J. F. Halloran to respond, which he did in his usual elegant style, though claiming now to be a retired member. His remarks were very entertaining, alluding to the work it has accomplished in building up the country and how its influence has often elevated to positions of honor and trust men who, without the aid of the press would have remained comparatively unknown. He was greeted with hearty applause, and at the conclusion of his remarks called on Major Weed, as an active member of the press to still further respond to the toast.

Fred Astor's representative referred to Mr. Rappleye as having accomplished a far more difficult feat than many would at first consider, and attributed his pluck and perseverance to the newspaper training he had received, complimented Col. Elliot F. Shepard, proprietor of the Mail and Express for the expense he had incurred in sending here on so long a journey, a representative of his paper, assuring him that such efforts by that journal would ever be remembered gratefully by our citizens, and especially mentioned the modesty and courtesy of Mr. Rappleye, who was so retiring and unassuming, though his name and mission had been widely published not only here in our own land, but by the press of foreign lands also.

Capt. Gray responded to the sentiment, "The People of Oregon," and none more appropriate could have been chosen, for he has the honor of being the first white male child born west of the Rocky mountains. His remarks were very entertaining, and he alluded to many points of interest, and was liberally applauded.

El. Wright, of the Columbian, claimed to be no speaker, but for all that he spoke finely and his remarks were well received.

Mr. Halloran called upon H. C. Thompson, mentioning him as having been born in Clatsop county, and though he is a young man not a vestige of his birthplace remains, for the white of the Pacific ocean now roll over the spot, which was once solid land, two miles from the water.

Mr. Thompson responded to the toast, "The Merchants of Astoria," and did it excellently, eliciting frequent applause, even if he is a man whose childhood home is covered by the surging waves, and spoke of the fact that land is now forming in consequence of the action of the jelly, and in time he expects to see his native place emerge from the water, and then he proposes to claim it by priority.

Taken as a whole, the festive occasion was one of great pleasure to the participants, and will long linger in memory's casket of gems as a desirable pearl.

MUCHLY MIXED.

A Chinese Woman Who Is in Great Demand.

The Chinese woman taken off the steamer Oregon, mention of whom was made in yesterday's issue of THE ASTORIAN, appears to be a victim of persecution by the Chinese. The old charge of her having stolen some \$1,500 in money, clothing, jewelry, etc., from the Pagan who is pursuing her was made. The strange part of the case is that the crime is alleged to have been committed in this county and state, while the woman came from San Francisco and was enroute to Portland at the time she was arrested. E. D. Winton appears as special counsel for the prosecution, and George Nolan looked after the interests of the woman. The merits of the case were not inquired into, the attorneys agreeing that the case be continued until next Tuesday. In the meantime the woman was released on \$1,500 bail.

A sequel to the arrest occurred when one of the several Chinese claiming to be the husband of the woman, caused a warrant to issue for the arrest of both the woman and the man who accompanied her from San Francisco, on a charge of adultery. Then came still another strange husband of the woman and caused a warrant to issue for the arrest of one of Winton, on a charge of perjury.

Justice Cleveland exacted a cash deposit for costs in all the cases and will try and untangle the much mixed up case next Tuesday.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

A Brief but Pleasant Session Last Evening.

The committee on revision of constitution by-laws reported progress and will have their full report ready for next meeting. They were allowed further time.

The special committee in reference to the establishment of a box factory here reported that they did not deem it expedient at this time to raise the required subsidy, and therefore recommended it be dropped for the present. Report adopted and committee discharged.

National board of trade will meet at New Orleans, Dec. 8, 1920, and this chamber was invited to send delegates, but there is not time for any one to reach there from this city, and the communication was ordered filed.

A committee was appointed, to try and arrange so that rice shipped from China via Victoria for a China firm in this city, shall not be obliged to be carried past here to Portland but shall be shipped direct to this city. The committee consists of President Bowley, J. W. Welch, E. A. Weed and W. H. Barker.

Several communications were read from various parties in different states, making inquiries as to cost of living, wages, land, business, etc., in this vicinity, and were referred to different members of the chamber to make reply.

Other matters of interest were discussed, but no votes taken. S. S. Gordon, cashier of the First National bank, stated that the rumor of his having stated that the value of the electric road was not over 40 per cent. of the subscription is entirely incorrect, as he had never said or written anything of the kind.

The chamber then adjourned.
