A flurry was caused on the floor of the San Francisco Exchange when a cabletram was made public property announc-ing that 10 per cent would be paid for reinsurance on the overdue vessel. No-body wanted any of it on account of the ligures, but a great deal of curlosity was displayed as to the source of the offer. It came from two of the big English com-panies, who have respectively 10,000 pounds and 15,000 pounds worth of risks on the valuable freight. If they raise their offer today or tomorrow the specu lators will jump at it.

The tactics of the Sallors' Union in starting a boarding house in San Fran-cisco and taking in all sallors that can be found willing to join them has had the effect of making non-union sailors a scarce commodity. Three vessels had non-union crews put on board and con-siderable difficulty was experienced by the shipping masters in getting the men.
