The North Shore Packing Company, while not in the combination, (owing to fact that several of the stockholders residing in the East have not had the opportunity of consulting their agents her as to the details) have agreed to abide by the regulations of the combination as to the price of materials, raw and canned fish, also to start fishing and to close down their cannery at the same time as he combination.

This leaves only one cannery on the lower river unrepresented, that of William Hume at Eagle Cliff, and as this is more of a private cannery and all the fis' is canned for certain buyers beforehand it was not deemed of importance that

this should be included. The main objects of the combination are to govern the selling price of fish and to prevent the indiscriminate sale by men under contract to the canneries to outside buyers. Heretofore the canneries have been in the habit of advancing to fishermen during the winter, money enough to buy provisions and twine to knit their nets for the cannery season, in return for which the fishermen have contracted to sell all the fish they caught whether large or small, to the canneries at a fixed price. Then, when the summer came, and the large fish began to run. agents for Portland and Eastern fish markets have made a practice of visit ing the lower river and offering a price somewhat lower than the canneries hav been paying, and buying the largest and best fish, leaving to the canneries nothing but the small fish and steelheads, with the probability of the fishermen being in debt to them at the end of the season. Against this, the combination expects, by rules hereafter to be fixed, to protect itself. It will also set a price on all cannery supplies such as tan bark, twine hangings, etc. and fix a rental for net

racks and boats. Regarding the number of canneries that will be run, and the maximum output of fish for the year, nothing has as yet bee decided, but it is generally understood that the canneries to be operated this year will be all those that were running last year, and no limit is to be placed o the output.

All these matters are to be in the hands of a board of directors which are to be ected. The prices for fish to be paid to the same body. Before this can be arranged, however, there will be a consultation with the Fishermen's Protective Union. No trouble is anticipated on this score as the combination is in favor of keeping the price of fish up to a standard that will enable them to maintain their well known and trained fisherme at a high enough rate to hold in check he fish buyers from the outside.
