The Oregon went out yesterday to San Francisco.

The three masted schooner Sallor Boy, Captain Peterson, arrived in Seattle from San Francisco shortly after noon on Monday. She had 135 tons of merchandise and carried a non-union crew. As the latter was about commencing to discharge the cargo at Schwabacher's some of the longshoremen appeared and drove the crew from the wharf. For a while it broked as if there would be bloodshird Captain ordered his mon to go to Those retuned, ciniming the longon would do them violence. In antime several police officees arrived and the trouble county hinwever, Captain Peterson could not induce his crew to unload the cargo, and the work was finally turned over to

Captain Peterson when seen by a Telegraph reporter, said:

"I have always been in sympathy with the union mon, but when I found that they wanted to run my business then I concluded to employ men who are not members of the union. The night before I left 'Frisco some union men attempted to remove my crew. I had several men on the watch. They were armed to the teeth, and I had informed them that I would be responsible for anything they did while protecting my property. During the night the union men made an attempt to get aboard. I was awakened by the noise, and at the point of revolvers we drove them away, I am going to lie here a couple of nights and if any attempt is made to steal my crew some one will get hurt."

Soon after the longshoremen had commenced discharging the Sailor Boy's cargo Chief Jackson called on Captain Peterson.

"If your crew wants to go to work" said the chief, "we'll protect them if it takes the entire force."

Captain Peterson, however, was willing that the longshoremen should continue, but he asked the chief for police assistance so long as his schooner remains in port. It is believed that there will be more trouble before the Sailor Boy takes her departure.
