

The Gambling Ordinance.

An ordinance providing for licensing, taxing, regulating and restraining gaming and gambling houses.

The City of Astoria does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. That no person or persons shall, either directly or indirectly, in person, or by another, set up, maintain, keep, or carry on, any gaming or gambling house, within the City of Astoria, Clatsop County, Oregon, except as in this ordinance provided, and any person who shall set up, maintain, keep or carry on any gaming, or gambling house in violation of the provisions of this ordinance, shall upon conviction thereof, where no other punishment is provided, be fined, in any sum not less than one hundred dollars, nor more than three hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail not exceeding one hundred days, or both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the auditor and police judge.

It is hereby made the duty of the chief of police of each police officer of the city, to see that this ordinance is strictly enforced, and to make complaint to the city attorney of each and every violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, and of the city attorney to prosecute all persons violating the same.

SECTION 2. Before any gaming, or gambling house shall be set up, maintained, or kept, or carried on within this city, the person, or persons desirous of setting up, maintaining, keeping, or carrying on the same shall apply for, and take out a license therefor, which license shall be in the name of the person applying therefor, shall designate the place, or house where gambling may be carried on, and shall not be transferable.

Before a license shall issue under this ordinance, the applicant shall petition the common council in the manner provided in section 3 hereof, and shall also present to the common council with said petition, a bond in the penal sum of five hundred dollars, with two or more sufficient sureties payable to the city of Astoria, conditional that he or they will well in all things comply with the provisions of this ordinance, during the period of one year from the date of the beginning of said license. Attached to said bond shall be an affidavit of the sureties to the effect that they are freeholders in the City of Astoria, and are in the aggregate worth one thousand dollars, over and above all their just debts and liabilities, and property exempt from execution.

SECTION 3. The petition of the applicant for a license shall state: First, the name of the applicant. Second, whether such applicant has before held, or whether he then holds a license, and if so, at what time such license expired or expires, and the kind of license.

Third, At what date such applicant desires such license to begin, and expire, and the place where such gaming, or gambling house is to be carried on.

Said petition shall be verified by the applicant, or if more than one, by at least one of the applicants, stating that such petition is true.

SECTION 4. The receipt of the treasurer shall be given to the applicant for the amount paid into the city treasury by him, and shall state that the amount paid by him is paid for a license for a gaming or gambling house, to be refunded in case the common council shall refuse to grant the petition of the applicant, otherwise upon issuing the license, to go into the police fund of the city. Upon the granting of the said petition by the common council, the mayor shall examine the bond of the applicant, and approve it if it is in compliance with the provisions of this ordinance therefor, otherwise to disapprove it.

SECTION 5. Upon a full compliance with the requirements of this ordinance by the petitioner, the granting of the said license by the common council and the approval of the applicant's bond by the mayor, the auditor and police judge shall issue to the applicant a license to carry on a gaming or gambling house for one year, and on a date to be specified in said license. Said license shall be numbered, and shall be for not less than one year, shall specify and designate by number the place or house where and where gaming or gambling may be carried on, the name of the proprietor, or proprietors, of such house, and the kind of license, whether first-class or second-class.

No part of any license money shall be refunded under any circumstances after a party, or parties shall have obtained a license, and no license shall be deemed, or construed to license or allow gaming or gambling to be carried on at any place other than that designated in said license, unless the common council by ordinance daily passed, permit the proprietor of such gaming or gambling house to change the location thereof.

SECTION 6. Any keeper of any gaming or gambling house who shall permit any breach of the peace, or disturbance of public order, or decorum by noisy or disorderly conduct, on the premises when it is within his, or her power to prevent the same, or who shall knowingly permit any minor to remain in, or about such gaming or gambling house, shall upon conviction thereof before the police court, be fined not less than fifty nor more than three hundred dollars, or be imprisoned in the city jail, not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred days, or both, in the discretion of the court, and shall forfeit his license for such gaming or gambling house, which forfeiture shall take effect upon the entering of the judgment of conviction in the aforesaid prosecution.

SECTION 7. Every house where any game is carried on, or conducted, or where any game is played for money, checks, credits, or other representative of value, shall be deemed a gaming or gambling house within the meaning of this ordinance. And it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to, or no person or persons shall set up, maintain, keep, carry on, or play any game or games for money, checks, credits, or other representative of value, except in a gaming or gambling house duly licensed as such.

SECTION 8. It is intended to apply to baseball, football, lawn tennis, or other athletic sports, or where cards are played or dice shaken for drinks or cigars only. And no person violating the provisions of this section shall upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not less than one hundred dollars, nor more than three hundred dollars, or imprisonment in the city jail not less than fifty nor more than one hundred days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

SECTION 9. It shall be unlawful for any minor to engage in any game, in any gaming or gambling house, or to remain or loiter in, or about any such house, and any person violating any of the provisions of this section, shall upon conviction thereof in the police court, be fined in any sum not exceeding three hundred dollars, or by imprisonment, not exceeding one hundred

days in the city jail, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court.

SECTION 10. No games, other than the following shall be set up, maintained, carried on, or played for money, checks, credits or representatives of value in any gaming or gambling house, or in any gaming or gambling house, except as provided in this ordinance, to-wit: roulette, carpe, per centage stud poker, China tan, or fan tan, seven up, pedro, round table stud poker, rounce, solo, pekyo, whist, trick whist, pin-pool, fifteen ball pool, billiards, hearts, eastern dice, poker dice, first throw five dice, first throw one dice, three card lou, draw poker, straight poker, casino, euchre, brag.

And the proprietor of any gaming or gambling house who shall permit any game to be played in his or her house, in violation of this section, and the section 10 of this ordinance, shall upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred dollars, nor more than three hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail not less than fifty, nor more than one hundred days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court, and such conviction shall make null and void the license of said proprietor, from the date of the entry of final judgment thereof.

SECTION 11. All faro games carried on in any gaming or gambling house, licensed under the provisions of this ordinance shall be dealt with a single card box, and without any stealing device connected therewith. All roulette games carried on thereunder shall be carried on with a thirty-six roulette wheel without any device for cheating. All crap games shall be played with square dice, and they, with all percentage stud poker, China tan, or fan tan games, shall be carried on without any device, or devices for cheating, and the above, and all other games set up, kept, maintained, carried on, or played without cheating, and without any device or devices for cheating. And any person or persons who shall set up, keep, maintain, carry on, or play any game in violation of any of the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding three hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail, not exceeding one hundred days, or by both fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court, and a final entry of a judgment of conviction in any such case shall render null and void any license for any gaming or gambling house held at the time by such person.

SECTION 12. Licenses shall be designated as "first-class gambling license" and "second-class gambling license." Any person or persons procuring a first-class gambling license, shall pay to the city treasurer under said license the sum of two thousand dollars per year, and shall be entitled under such license to set up, keep, maintain, and carry on, in his gaming or gambling house, or all of the games mentioned in Section 10 of this ordinance, and any person or persons procuring a second-class gambling license, shall pay to the city treasurer therefor, a sum of one hundred dollars per year, and shall be entitled under such license to set up, keep, maintain, and carry on, in his gaming or gambling house, or all of the games mentioned in Section 10 of this ordinance, except roulette, carpe, per centage stud poker, China tan, or fan tan, seven up, pedro, round table stud poker, rounce, solo, pekyo, whist, trick whist, pin pool, fifteen ball pool, billiards, hearts, eastern dice, poker dice, first throw five dice, first throw one dice, three card lou, draw poker, straight poker, casino, euchre, brag.

SECTION 13. If any game, or device, or any police officer of the city shall have power and authority, and it is their duty whenever they or either of them shall suspect that any game is being set up, kept, maintained, carried on, or played, in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, to inspect such game, and the device or devices with which it is provided, carried on, or played, whenever he shall find it being kept, carried on, or played, in violation of this ordinance, or any of its provisions, and to produce the same in evidence upon the prosecution of the person setting up, keeping, maintaining, carrying on, or playing said game, and dispose of the same in the manner ordered by the court where said case is tried.

Provided that if any game or the device with which the game is carried on, is found to be constructed in a manner different from the requirements of this ordinance, said case may be entered up an order directing that the same be destroyed, and thereupon said order shall be carried into effect by the chief of police, or any police officer or by any person designated by said court for that purpose.

SECTION 14. In case of the violation of any of the provisions of any bond, required to be given by applicant for license under this ordinance, the city attorney shall prosecute the same in a civil action in any court of competent jurisdiction.

SECTION 15. Each and every person having a license under the provisions of this ordinance, shall be carried on at all times while it is in force, in a conspicuous place in his gaming or gambling house, and any person violating the provisions of this section shall be fined not exceeding fifty dollars, or be imprisoned not exceeding twenty-five days, or both, in the discretion of the court.

SECTION 16. This ordinance shall be printed in full in all licenses issued under its provisions.

SECTION 17. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance, and for which no punishment or penalty is provided, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding three hundred dollars, or shall be imprisoned in the city jail not exceeding one hundred days, or both, in the discretion of the court.

SECTION 18. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance, and for which no punishment or penalty is provided, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding three hundred dollars, or shall be imprisoned in the city jail not exceeding one hundred days, or both, in the discretion of the court.

Children Cry for Pitcher's Castoria

Easter Services To-morrow.

At the Congregational church, Rev. D. Staver, pastor, Easter will be observed by a Sunday school concert in the morning, consisting of appropriate music and recitations by the children and young people. In the evening there will be Easter music by the choir, and a sermon on the subject of "The Resurrection." Services in the German language, with holy communion, in the afternoon at 2:30. One week from Easter Sunday Rev. C. F. Clapp, Superintendent of home missions for Oregon, will occupy the pulpit at the Congregational church morning and evening.

Rev. L. Nissen, of the Norwegian Evangelical church, will hold Easter services tomorrow morning at 10:30 and in the evening at 7:30 at the IXL cannery, Hemlock street, Uppertown. On Easter Monday services will be held at the same time and place.

At the Presbyterian church the Sabbath school will hold Easter services at 11 a. m. Sermon in the evening on "Lies and Crime," by the pastor. Young people's society at 6:30 p. m.

Rev. J. N. Wood will deliver the morning sermon at the Methodist Episcopal church, of which Rev. G. A. Landen, is pastor. His sermon will be especially helpful to Christians. An Easter concert will be given by the Sunday school at 7 p. m. This service will consist of songs, recitations and class exercises. An especially attractive Sabbath school service has been arranged for this church. It will be as follows: Easter anthem by the choir, "Christ Arose," song by the school. Recitations: "Introductory address," Hattie Ralston; "Make Way," (an Easter carol), Carrie Bosworth; "Easter" Willie Cyrus; "Come Over and Help Us," Miss Bell's class; duet, Ina and Janie Landen. Recitations—"The Great Work of the Church," Arthur Imhoff; "Bible Hymn of Missions," Pearl Estes. Class song. Recitations—"Missionary," Day, Susie Roberts; "Offerings to the Genius of Christianity," Miss Campbell's class. Song by the school. Closing address, Sadie Imhoff.

At the Baptist church regular services will be held. Preaching morning and evening by the pastor. Sunday school at 12 m. Young people's meeting at 6:30. Morning sermon on "Resurrection," subject of the evening sermon: "Is License a Remedy?"

Rev. Dr. Garner will address the men's Gospel meeting in the Y. M. C. A. hall at 3 o'clock, Sunday afternoon.

Mr. C. W. Shively has a long letter in yesterday's Oregonian on the railroad question. In the course of it, he says:

"Does it not therefore seem reasonable that the time has arrived when the Union Pacific must occupy new territory, which justly and in a commercial sense belongs to it? I have reference to the watershed of the Columbia and tributaries, but more especially that section of country between the city of Portland and Astoria, via the Nehalem. The system of the Union Pacific which occupies a large section of the Upper Columbia basin by many miles of trackage, with branches radiating from its main line, should hold the traffic of the Inland Empire of the Columbia basin, and while a continuation of the road on a water level from Portland down the Columbia to Astoria should be built by the company, still, until the Union Pacific build from Portland to Astoria, via the Nehalem, its system will not be able to control the traffic of the watershed of the Columbia. The vast timber belt along the route between Portland and Astoria would create an immense traffic and benefit Portland as much as Astoria."

ANOTHER TRAIN WRECK. Atlanta, Ga., March 31.—A train on the Georgia Florida Railway went through a trestle a few miles from here this evening and was totally wrecked. Eight freight and two passenger cars fell a distance of fifty feet and were torn to splinters. One man is dead and half a dozen others are badly injured.

A \$100,000 FIRE.

Walnut Ridge, Ark., March 31.—Thirteen houses were destroyed by fire here this evening. A man and child perished in the hotel and another man is probably fatally injured and two others sustained broken limbs by jumping. Loss, \$100,000.

WILL RESIST GEARY LAW.

San Francisco, Cal., March 31.—The Chinese Six Companies today issued a new circular officially and openly advising the Chinese to refuse compliance with the Geary law.

CHOLERA SPREADING RAPIDLY.

Vienna, March 31.—A Vienna physician sent to southeastern Hungary to report on the progress of cholera, says the epidemic is spreading rapidly.
