TODAY'S WEATHER.

Portland, April 14.—For Oregon and Washington, fair weather, except preceded by showers in Northwestern Washington.

Local weather for the twenty-four hours ending at 5 p. m., yesterday, furnished by the U. S. department of agriculture, weather bureau: Maximum temperature, 49 degrees. Minimum temperature, 40 degrees. Precipitation, .15 inch.

THE PEST HOUSE QUESTION.

Astoria needs a pest house. Where shall it be? This is a question that presents many difficulties for solution. There is considerable room inside the city limits, but there can hardly be found any place where a pest house could be located without protest.

No one wants to live near an institution of that kind or own land in its vicinity. Of course some of the ideas regarding the dangers of proximity to a hospital for contagious diseases are very much exaggerated.

Small-pox is the disease that we of Astoria have most to fear. This disease is always in existence somewhere. It is most likely to come to us from the north, carried by vessels that are handling Chinese.

When one case appears in a city like Astoria it is seldom that it is not followed by more. If Olsen's case is not followed by others soon, it must be admitted that it is owing about as much to good luck as good management.

We should be prepared to stamp out the disease as soon as it shows itself among us. How is it to be done if no suitable building or hospital be provided? Olsen's case demonstrates plainly the need for a quarantine hospital that shall be ready at an hour's notice for the reception of the infected.

When the city authorities attempt to place a small-pox patient in the city's pesthouse, they are confronted by frantic citizens who threaten them with peril of death if they deposit the patient in their neighborhood.

So the unlucky wretch is toiled about and finally put in a place where it is difficult to provide him with proper protection from the weather or with medical assistance.

Such negligence is nothing less than inhumanity, and now that the matter has been so forcibly shown it should not be allowed to occur again, for if it should, it might well be termed criminal negligence.

There should and must be a quarantine hospital for this city. If there is no proper place that can be secured on

this peninsula for its establishment, let The Astorian make a suggestion. Secure a vessel, a barge, or a scow, and anchor it in some sheltered, accessible place, and have it fitted up for a quarantine hospital.

Anyone who has anything to say regarding the advantage or disadvantage of such a vessel is invited to give his views.
