The council may become convinced that money would better be in the city treasury than in the pockets of those who have obtained it by violating the law, and will use it to enable them to continue violating it.

The question is should the solid business men of this city be compelled to put all the money in the city treasury to pay for the enforcement of laws Or should those who make the trouble and expense be made to contribute to peace and good order.

Salmon Situation

On the River

The difference of opinion among the fishermen seems to have quieted down, and there are now but few who have not come to the conclusion that the will of the majority is supreme. As a rule the men are much pleased with the result of the strike for an increased price over that of last year, and while the pirates are still heard grumbling at the failure of their schemes, the honest fishermen are, without an exception, as happy as is possible considering the comparative scarcity of salmon. One of the canners said to an Astorian reporter yesterday, that he did not blame the pirates so much as he did the poachers who aided and abetted in the commission of acts of piracy, and wisely remarked that were it not for encouragement received from some of the canners, the pirates would find their occupation gone.

The catch still continues light, and while all of the cannerles are packing, some of the owners seem rather indifferent about the amount put up. Several of them state that at the present selling price of salmon, their is no money in the business, and that the only way to make money is to leave the business alone. Others say that a few cents a case can be made, and hope for an improvement in the market.

The expected increase of almost 50 per cent. in the Alaska pack, is viewed with more or less alarm by many packers, for while the royal Chinook must always retain its primary place in the markets of the world, the Alaska product, with that class of consumers to whom a cent or two a can is a material consideration, is an important factor in determining the price of the superior goods put up on the Columbia river.

Many of the fish caught at present are pink, and at one of the canneries on Tuesday, out of a pack of sixty-two cases eleven were light-colored goods, which, although regarded by experts as containing more oil than the red fish, are not so acceptable to the mass of consumers.

The expected increase of 300,000 in the Frazer river pack will also assist in stocking the market with an inferior class of goods.
