The catch of salmon was lighter per boat yesterday than for some days past, a fact due to the greater number of boats that had been out the previous night. The average catch, as far as could be learned, was five fish, averaging about twenty-two pounds, per boat.

The steamer Harvest Queen went down to Kinney's cannery yesterday afternoon and took aboard some 500 cases. At this cannery there were about 600 fish received. From these, 200 cases were packed. The Cutting Packing Co., put up about 100 cases, and Elmore's about a similar amount. The feeling among the canners has improved but little, and unless there is a decided change in the tone of the market, the outlook for money making is very poor.

Mr. John Wallace, a prominent fish shipper at Kalama, Wash., gives, in Ice and Refrigeration, some interesting facts in relation to the rail shipment of frozen fish, which may be of general value. As our readers will know, a large quantity of frozen salmon finds its way from the freezing plants at the fisheries to the East. In shipping the trade recognizes the fact that fish frozen solid will in part refrigerate themselves. They therefore pack them tightly in boxes and load into refrigerator cars. These cars are first reduced to as low a temperature as practicable, and then the floor is covered with several inches of chilled sawdust. The boxes of fish are then loaded in, leaving a space of several inches between the sides, ends, and top of the car, which also is filled with cold sawdust. Then the car is closed and sealed. No ice is placed in the tanks of the car, but it has been found by quite extensive experience that fish so packed for shipment reach their destination in perfect condition in reasonably warm weather without ice, and that, too, after a passage of fifteen to eighteen days. The saving effected is the first cost of the ice; then cost of freight on the ice, and also a gain of 1,500 pounds of fish in lieu of that much weight of ice, which by the practice of the N. P. road is allowed free.

The following communication, which was received last night, will be found self explanatory:

Editor of The Astorian: Referring to the article appearing in yesterday's Examiner regarding charges said to have been preferred against Rev. R. B. Dilworth, the session of the Presbyterian church held called upon to correct several exaggerated statements contained in that article. In the first place no charges have been officially preferred against him, neither has he been arraigned to answer any charges.

The meeting referred to in the Examiner was held for the purpose of investigating certain reports emanating from a member of the church. The session is of the opinion from information then and afterwards obtained, that the reports would by no means bear the construction that has been uncharitably placed upon them, but the matter will probably be investigated hereafter by the Presbytery, as Mr. Dilworth desires.

It is, perhaps, due to Mr. Dilworth to say that the announcement of his resignation as pastor of the church last Sabbath morning, was not made, as has been reported, by request of the session.
