# By the Waters.

The badly decomposed body of a man was picked up yesterday on the beach between L. J. Johnson's cigar store and the auction house of Mr. Heacock. It was found by Pete Masden, whose fishing boat was swamped Friday, and who was engaged yesterday in a search for his oars, when he suddenly came upon the corpse. Police Captain Hallock was immediately calland he informed Coroner Pohl, The two then towed the body to Hume's dock. It was in a horrible state, totally unrecognizable, being so far gone and bruised with the contact with the rocks and through the action of the water that the eyes, nose and ears were missing, and when lifted the fingers dropped off. The hair had all disappeared from both head and face,

The description is as follows: Height, five feet nine inches; weight, probably about 155 to 160 pounds.
