**ALONG THE WHARVES.**

An arrangement has been made between the United States Government and the Red Star line with reference to the carriage of the mails between the Continent and America, by virtue of which the company is building four 10,000-ton steamers of 20 knot speed. Besides Southampton and Antwerp a French port will be called at.

The following is an instance of remarkable sailing which deserves record. The British ship Loch Eive, Capt. William Stuart, left the Clyde for Melbourne on the 16th of October last, and arrived out on the 25th of December, equal to 70 days. She remained only one month in port, and left homewards on the 26th of January. She was signalled off Prawl Point on the 25th of April—88 days—thus doing the whole round in the short time of six and a half months.

The British ship Clackmannanshire is the latest addition to the list of shipping on route to this port.

The bark Geo. S. Homer should arrive at this port shortly, being out 137 days from New York.

The Haytian Republic entered at the custom house yesterday from British and American sound ports. She arrived the preceding night, and had 100 Chinese aboard. The Mongolians are some of those who were taken back to Victoria by the Danube last week. They had made their way over to Vancouver with a view to again attempting to effect a landing in Portland. The Republic went up the river after sending her papers to the custom house.

Commencing today the steamer Ilwaco will leave this city hereafter for Ilwaco at 8 o'clock. The steamer will also run on Sundays during the season, commencing tomorrow.

The Manzanita will take a supply of coal out to the lightship this morning.

The steamer Thompson struck a snag yesterday morning on her way from Portland, and sustained damage to her rudder. The necessary repairs detained her for a short time.

When the LaCamas was going through the "cut-off" round by the cape yesterday afternoon her wheel got tangled up in a net. It was two hours before she was able to proceed.

The British bark Olmara sailed for Queenstown for orders yesterday morning.
