The British ship Torrisdale has arrived in San Francisco from Newcastle, N. S. W., after a passage of 97 days. She brings a cargo of coal. The trip of the vessel to this port will be remembered by quite a number of the crew. Twelve of them refused to do duty, and Captain Buchanan ordered them put in irons. The trouble occurred March 1st. It was with difficulty that the men were ironed, but the job was successfully carried out. Six of the crew were left in irons for three days, five of them suffered confinement for two days, and one gave in after the first day
