ALONG THE WHARVES.

The steamer Scotia arrived down at an early hour yesterday morning. Fifteen hundred cases of salmon were taken on at this point for San Francisco, consigned to Eastern points. The steamer South Coast, of the Truckee-Scotia line, leaves San Francisco this morning and has a heavy shipment for this port.

The Truckee arrived in from San Francisco at 7:30 yesterday morning. One hundred tons of general merchandise was unloaded at the A. S. Co's dock, consigned to local merchants. She proceeded up the river at 11:30 with a heavy cargo for Portland.

The small British steamer Cogitlan, which arrived in from Victoria, Thursday morning, is making the Haytian Republic run, the latter vessel being still in the hands of the authorities at Seattle.

The British bark Helensala, with grain for Queenstown for orders, was spoken in latitude 50 south, longitude 50 west, on April 10th.

The British ship Skeimorie, hence for Queenstown for orders, has gone to Falmouth to discharge her cargo of wheat.

The British bark Carnedd Llewellyn left Falmouth on the 27th ult. for her port of discharge.

All the spars which the Western Belle is to take to New York, are now on board. The remainder of the cargo will consist of lumber.

OREGON AT THE EXPOSITION.

Complete Headquarters Established Convenient to Jackson Park. Having no state building which visitors from their state could use as a sort of general headquarters a party of patriotic Oregonians have organized the Oregon World's Fair Headquarters Association, whose object is to supply this want to their visiting friends from the Webfoot state.

The association has leased a commodious three-story residence on Michigan avenue next to Peck court. This building is now being renovated and furnished preparatory to making it a home for Oregonians and their friends.

On the ground floor will be double reception parlors, billiard parlor, library, reading-room, smoking-room and office. On the second floor will be ladies' parlors, private rooms for gentlemen and advertising rooms. About the front and south side is being erected a spacious veranda, that the members may, to better advantage, observe the beauty of the lake, those who through the park, and the gay turn-outs upon the city's most popular driveway.

Throughout the house will be placed paintings by Stuart, who has lately passed two years sketching in the picturesque Northwest, together with the works of local artists, showing attractive resorts for tourists, and scenes in the mining and lumbering camps. The furnishing of the house, its location and management, carry the assurance that the far away state will not be unobserved during the great exposition. The officers of the organization are President Colonel R. W. Mitchell, Secretary Charles N. Miller, Treasurer W. S. Ladd, and Manager W. S. Sharpstein, who is in charge at Chicago.

Every convenience for the comfort of the visitors will be provided to make their visit to the fair as pleasant and profitable as possible.

The organization has been approved by the Oregon state commission, under the official signature of President Geo. C. Myers and Secretary C. B. Irvine. It is estimated that the attendance from Oregon will not be less than 15,000.

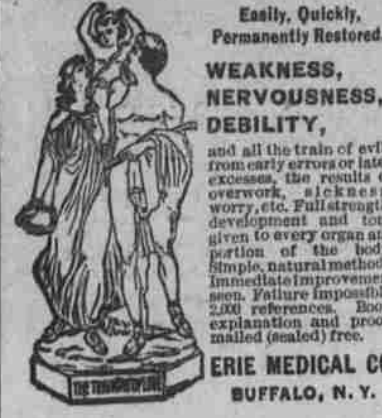
