MEETING OF THE CITY FATHERS

Large Amount of Routine Business Transacted.

MUCH NEEDLESS DISCUSSION

The Ordinance Providing for the Closing of Barber Shops on Sunday is Laid Away.

The city council men last evening, Mayor Crosby in the chair, and the other members present being Messrs. Welch, McGregor, Bergman, O'Hara, Barker, Webber.

A. C. Carlson was granted a liquor license.

A petition from Councilman Lewis for leave of absence was read, and granted.

Protest of citizens against the closing of barbershops was read and placed on file.

Martin Olsen submitted a petition asking that there be refunded to him \$10.40 as part of the sum of \$25 paid by him for an auctioneer's license on May 14th last for one year from that date. The petition set forth that petitioner was entitled to a license for twelve months from the date of his application. It was shown that this was not in accordance with the terms of the law, and the document was received and placed on file.

Owners of real estate on Seventh street petitioned for a change of grade at the intersection of Seventh and Cass streets. Referred to the street committee.

A communication from the committee of nine, appointed last Saturday to take steps toward a reduction in taxation, asking that the time be extended for turning in the city tax roll, was received and placed on file.

The report of the street committee on a claim presented by Fred Sherman was adopted. The conclusion arrived at was that the records were the proper guide.

The different pay rolls for the month of May were received, and the auditor instructed to draw warrants for the payment of the same.

A compromise proposition from Messrs. Warren and Joplin, and the Stevens and Wilson estate, in the matter of the Court street suits, was referred to the city attorney.

The police report on electric lights for May was ordered placed on file.

A communication from the Clatsop Mill Co., withdrawing a bid for lumber, referred to the street committee.

The report of the city surveyor on the cost of improving West Ninth street, was referred to the street committee. A motion to indefinitely postpone the improvement prevailed.

The city attorney in a communication recommended that the justice court case of L. Lebeck vs. the city of Astoria be appealed to the circuit court. Adopted.

The report of Surveyor Harry on extra work on Fifth street was received, placed on file, and the street committee instructed to advertise for bids.

City Health Officer Walker's report on the small-pox case was read and ordered placed on file.

An ordinance was read a first and second time defining the duties and fixing the compensation of the city assessor.

An ordinance was passed under suspension of the rules, appropriating the sum of \$268.05 out of the general fund for the benefit of sundry small-pox claims.

Under suspension of the rules an ordinance was passed appropriating the sum of \$27.50 out of the road fund for the payment of the road pay roll for the month of May.

The ordinance defining the duties and fixing the compensation of the city assessor, was finally passed.

The barbers' Sunday closing ordinance was indefinitely postponed.

Claims were ordered paid as follows: C. A. May, \$1; Liddle and Cribb, \$8; Astoria Iron Works, \$98.03.

A number of claims were read a first time and referred to their respective committees.

Dr. Walker submitted his bill of \$600 for attendance on the small-pox patient.

Under the head of unfinished business, an ordinance was read a first and second time appropriating the sum of \$600 for the payment of the above bill.

It was moved and seconded that the city attorney prepare an opinion for the next meeting in regard to the apparent conflict between the charter as amended and the general state law applying to the manner of making assessments.

Adjourned.

ROSEBERY AND THE BUTLER.

Curious Story Told of a Duel Fought in the Days of Louis Philippe.

A man who helped to make a curious diplomatic episode in the days of Louis Philippe's reign died a few days ago in Passy, a suburb of Paris. He was known among his neighbors simply as Francois, and according to the New York Sun, for half a century or more he had lived at leisure on the profits accruing to him from a duel he had fought in his youth with the father of the present Earl of Rosebery, secretary of state for foreign affairs in Mr. Gladstone's cabinet. Francois had resigned his position as a non-commissioned officer in the French cavalry to assume the more lucrative duties of butler in the house of a complete French statesman. One day old Lord Rosebery

came to see his master about the business of the British government. Francois declared that he could not deliver Lord Rosebery's card to his master, who was then engaged, and advised Lord Rosebery, whom he did not recognize, to secure a letter granting an audience and return later. This was too much for the British statesman, and thrusting his card into Francois' hand he commanded him angrily to deliver it at once. Francois, after starting away with the card, stopped to read the name on it. Lord Rosebery reproved him so sharply that Francois replied impudently. An angry exchange of words followed, and the master of the house came to the reception-room to learn the cause of the disturbance. Francois was discharged at once. On the next day Lord Rosebery received this note:

Sir:—Yesterday I was a servant; today I am a free man. I no longer allow your insults to pass. As a former officer in the cavalry of the French army I demand satisfaction.

Lord Rosebery accepted the challenge and two shots were exchanged without injury to anybody concerned. Francois was satisfied, but Lord Rosebery was nettled at the thought that his antagonist might at any time lay aside the dignity of a retired officer to become a butler again and expose him to the reproach of having fought with a servant. He therefore gave Francois an annuity of 6,000 francs on the condition of his abstaining from domestic service in the future and thus preserving his personality as a retired man of honor. Francois fulfilled his part of the agreement as faithfully as did Lord Rosebery and never worked afterward; at least, that is what is affirmed by the French newspapers which have incorporated this story in their obituary notices of the butler of honor.

GONE TO CANADA.

Boston, June 6.—Hon. Moody Merrill, for many years a prominent lawyer, street railway president and legislator, has mysteriously disappeared from this city. It is stated his affairs are in bad shape. Attachments suits aggregating nearly \$200,000 have been commenced against him.
