THE AUSTIN REGATTA.

Austin, Texas, June 10.—The Austin regatta came off today. The great professional race was begun between Gaudaur, Peterson and Rogers. The prizes were \$1,500 to the first, \$500 to the second, \$300 to the third and \$200 to the fourth. The distance was three miles with a turn. Peterson and Stanbury seemed to be the most vigorous, but Gaudaur's long, steady stroke was sufficient to give confidence to his backers, although he was slightly behind up to the turning stake. On the turn Gaudaur did the quickest work, and got on the stretch with the same long, steady pull that he started with. On the stretch there never was a doubt as to his victory. He easily got the lead length by length, until he was ten lengths ahead of Peterson, and he made the finish at that distance, followed by Peterson, Stanbury, Hanlon, Teemer and Rogers. The time was nineteen minutes and six seconds. The consolation race between Teemer, Ten Eyck, and Rogers was won by Ten Eyck by a quarter of a length, Teemer second. Time, 22 minutes 29-1-2 seconds.

SHOOTING SCRAPE IN IDAHO. Wallace, Idaho, June 10.—James Harrington was shot and probably fatally injured this morning, by R. A. Cunningham, a cook at the Gorn restaurant. Harrington kicked a dog belonging to Cunningham. When the latter resented the act he drew his revolver, slaying it across his breast in imitation of cross bones. Cunningham went across the room, securing his revolver and shot three times. Harrington formerly lived in Virginia City, Nevada, and said to have killed several men.

CARGO OF SULPHUR LOST. San Francisco, June 10.—The sulphur cargo of the British ship Elmbank, recently arrived from Hokodate, Japan, was discovered on fire at noon today, while the vessel was discharging at the wharf. An immense quantity of water was poured into the hold by the fire department without avail. The vessel will be sunk to save her, but the cargo, consisting of 1,900 tons of sulphur, will be a total loss.

TROUBLE IN NICARAGUA. New York, June 10.—A special from Mexico to the Times represents that there is grave danger of a collision between the United States marines and the populace in Nicaragua. The troops it is stated, have landed and thrown up fortifications at Santa Fe in order to protect the canal company's property. The government of Nicaragua will endeavor to prevent an outbreak, but the situation is serious.

PRICELESS LACES STOLEN. Chicago, June 10.—A startling disclosure was made at the fair grounds this evening, when the priceless laces sent here by Queen Margherita of Italy were unpacked. While the laces were being taken out of their cases and each piece counted, it was found that thirty pieces were missing. Cablesgrams were immediately sent to Rome apprising the queen of the loss.

NO OCCASION FOR IT. Cleveland, Ohio, June 10.—The new World's Fair special train over the New York Central and Lake Shore roads, making the distance between New York and Chicago in twenty hours has been abandoned after a two weeks' trial.

AN INJUNCTION GRANTED. Chicago, June 10.—Chief Justice Fuller today entered an order suspending the temporary injunction granted by the United States circuit court to restrain the management of the World's Fair from opening the grounds Sunday. He set the hearing in the cause in the United States court of appeals for Thursday next.

EXCEEDS REQUIREMENTS. New London, Conn., June 10.—The gun boat Machias was given a trial trip today and the cruise showed her to be a successor of the great New York. She has beaten the required speed of thirteen knots by two full knots and probably more. The average of the entire trip was 15.17.

RAYARD IN ENGLAND. Southampton, June 10.—The city is in holiday dress in honor of the arrival on the steamer Paris of the first American ambassador, Hon. Thomas F. Bayard. The municipal authorities presented him with an illuminated address on his arrival.

APPARENTLY SATISFIED. Minneapolis, June 10.—A statement of the assets and liabilities of the Northwestern Guaranty Loan Company, filed this afternoon shows general assets of \$5,262,514; general liabilities, \$3,145,722.78.

WASHINGTON LETTER. Senator Vorhees is probably as well versed in political trickery as any man in the United States. Although supposed to stand for everything that is anti-Cleveland, particularly on the financial question, he has controlled more presidential patronage up to date than any other single member of the senate.

That's why so many people say that he has bargained away his vote on the silver question, at the coming session of congress, for patronage; but of that your correspondent does not want to express an opinion; the record of Mr. Vorhees is well known, and if he goes back on it when congress meets, the public can draw its own conclusions, but so long as he can get offices for his constituents it is not probable that they will bother themselves about a

little thing like a comersault on the financial question.

But it was of a little political trickery in which he is just now engaged that I started to tell. Of course every newspaper reader is familiar with the high-handed doings of Postmaster Donham at Terre Haute, Ind., in dismissing all the republican letter carriers as soon as he took charge of his office, against the rules of the post office department as well as the civil service law. Civil Service Commissioner Roosevelt went out there and made a personal investigation, and his report is dead against the post master, although it has not yet been approved by the other commissioners, but it unquestionably will be. Now that particular postmaster is one of Vorhees' henchmen and Vorhees got here as soon as commissioner Roosevelt did, determined to prevent his being punished or dismissed. In order to strengthen himself with Mr. Cleveland, whose weakness he has long since learned, he had himself interviewed as soon as he arrived in Washington and filled a half column with the most fulsome flattery of the wisdom and statesmanship of the president. He calculates by this bit of humbuggery to pull the wool over the president's eyes and prevent any action being taken on the report of Mr. Roosevelt. Mr. Roosevelt cannot begin to match the senator for trickiness, but he is all the same a hard fighter and it is determined that Donham shall be punished, and if he isn't look out for a row.

Secretary Hoke Smith has repealed an order that was issued by General Raum and Assistant Bussey, constructing "disability not of service origin," which he hopes will keep the veterans out of from \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000 a year. Under the construction which Secretary Smith has decided shall be put upon the pension act of 1890, a man's "disability not of service origin" will have to be sufficient to prevent his earning a support by manual labor before he will be allowed a pension.

Attorney General Olney has, according to a story current here, been set down upon by Mr. Cleveland. Mr. Olney was determined to make the fight of his life to compel the World's Fair people to obey the law as to Sunday closing, but Secretary Gresham told Mr. Cleveland that it would make the administration very unpopular in the West, where the people were practically unanimous in favor of Sunday opening. If any extraordinary efforts were made by the attorney general to compel it to close. Then the attorney general was told that he must do nothing more than he was compelled to do in the matter. He objected to the interference with his plans, but he was quickly made to understand who was bossing the machine, just as his colleagues had been before him, and he suddenly concluded to make a visit to Boston, leaving the district attorney at Chicago to make his fight for Sunday closing alone, and without even the moral support of the administration.

Hon. Robert T. Lincoln, who has proved his ability as an executive officer, and as a diplomat, by four years service in the cabinet and by four years service as United States minister to service as U. S. minister to Great Britain making his final report to the department of state. He will resume his connection with the Chicago law firm from which he retired four years ago to accept the position he has lately vacated. While firmly of the opinion that the republican party will on account of its undying principles soon be restored to power, Mr. Lincoln declines to talk politics at this time, because he says he is for the present out of politics and must devote his time to money making, as he spent while residing in London just \$70,000 more than his salary. Mr. Gresham accompanied Mr. Lincoln when he called at the white house to pay respects to the president. Solicitor General Aldrich practiced Saturday, to return to his private practice in Chicago. He leaves a record that any lawyer in the U. S. might be proud of without laying himself open to the charge of egotism.
