The Custom House Changes.

Collector Taylor yesterday confirmed the report that he had received instructions from Washington to remove inspectors Linville and Kearney, but stated that no information relative to charges had been received by him. He telegraphed the Secretary of the Treasury asking that light be thrown on the subject. The Collector said: "The instructions were a complete surprise to me. Of course, if any well founded cause exists for their removal, that is all right; but it is only fair that the inspectors, as well as myself, should know what prompted the action of the department. I have yet received no answer to the dispatch I sent today, but I am determined to know all the

Collector Linville was called upon by an Astorian reporter, and asked what measures, if any, he had taken to learn the reason of his discharge. "I am altogether in the dark," he said, "but shall not long remain so. 
