TODAY'S WEATHER.

Portland, Or. June 21.—Forecast for
Oregon and Washington: Continued
fair weather; light to fresh northwest
to north winds in western portion;
light to fresh variable winds in eastern
portions.

hours ending at 5 p. m., yesterday,
furnished by the U. S. Department of
Agriculture, weather bureau.

Maximum temperature, 61 degrees.
Minimum temperature, 51 degrees.

Excess of precipitation from July 1st,
to date, 11.22 inches.

Senator Stanford, whose death we
announced yesterday, was not an ac-
tive member of the United States sen-
ate, but he exercised much influence
there in a quiet way. His popular
leanings impaired the authority with
which he might speak on public ques-
tions, as a benefactor and successful
merchant and railroad capitalist. The
whole country will remember grate-
fully that he endowed, with \$20,000,000,
the university which bears his name.
As a practical farmer and breeder of
fine horses, he also rendered much ser-
vice to the country at large. It should be
said to the honor of Leland Stanford,
that like Peter Cooper "he went about
doing good," and did not wait until
the approach of death to make public
benefactions.

Baron de Courcelles, the president of
the court of arbitration, administered
a merited rebuke on Tuesday to Sir
Richard Webster when that lawyer in-
timated that England may not regard
the decision of the court as legally
binding. The baron insisted that nei-
ther country can reject the award which
the tribunal will make. The baron
very properly implies that a sense of
honor will be as binding as actual force,
on the United States and England.

Some papers sneer at the announce-
ment that "the depositors will be paid
in full," which is often coupled with
bank failures. They ought to know
that it is quite common for a bank to
be perfectly solvent and yet be unable
to meet large, unexpected demands for
cash. In New York the savings banks
take care to stipulate for ample notice
from depositors, although in practice
they pay all checks at sight.

It appears that the Oregon office
seekers who have been encamped in
Washington are all about to depart.
They have drawn more prizes than
other state committees, and will travel
toward the setting sun with smiling
faces. Secretary Gresham, however,
appears to have allowed them little
chance to scramble for office in his de-
partment.

We have looked in vain for an ode
in honor of the Infanta Eulalia from
the pen of Eugene Field, the poet
laureate of Chicago. We trust that
proximity to the stock yards and board
of trade will not mar the poetic in-
spiration of this gifted child of the West.

The Elks are enjoying hugely the
hospitality of Detroit. Charles J. Cur-
tis, who represents the Astoria lodge,
no doubt displayed much emotion when
the New York lodge returned, like the
prodigal son, and asked to be rein-
stated.

All the public spirited merchants in
our city will close their stores Friday,
in order that everyone may be free to
attend the grand picnic. The clerks
are entitled to a holiday, and should
have it.

Governor Markham should appoint as
Senator Stanford's successor a man of
undoubted ability and patriotism. There
are many such men in California. May
the governor make a worthy choice.

Precautions

Against Fire.

The following circular has been is-
sued by the Pacific Coast Association of
Fire Chiefs, and will be mailed by Sec-
retary R. S. Worsley today to all the
offices of importance on the coast:

Office of the Secretary,
Astoria, June 8, 1893.
To the Honorable, the Chief Engineer,
Board of Fire Commissioners and
Committees on Fire and Water of the
Common Councils.

Dear Sirs: The appalling loss of 178
lives and of eighteen millions of dol-
lars worth of property that was de-
stroyed by fire in the United States
during the celebration of our national
holiday, the Fourth of July, 1892, impels
us as an organization bound together
for the purpose of saving the lives and
property of our fellow men from de-
struction by fire, to respectfully ad-
monish and caution the various fire
department officials throughout our
jurisdiction, and respectfully request:
That no fire department apparatus be
allowed to be used for any public pa-
rades or demonstration; that all chiefs
of volunteer departments make special
inspection and know that all apparatus,
especially hose, is in good order and
ready for instant use; that no liberties
be given in full-paid departments, and
that all call men in part paid depart-
ments be placed upon full time from the
3d, until the evening of the 5th of
July. By the practice of these pre-
cautions we hope to prevent any seri-
ous losses throughout our jurisdiction.

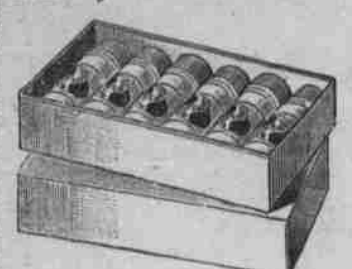
