**TODAY'S WEATHER.**

Portland, July 3.—For Oregon and Washington: Continued fair weather.

Local weather for the twenty-four hours ending at 5 p. m., yesterday, furnished by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, weather bureau.

Maximum temperature, 66 degrees.  
Minimum temperature, 54 degrees.  
Precipitation, .01 inch.  
Total precipitation from July 1st, 1893, to date, .61 inch.  
Deficiency of precipitation from July 1st, 1893, .11 inch.

Nothing has been done of late by the water commission toward securing the right of way for the proposed pipe line to Bear Creek. The cause of the inaction has been due to the opposition of property-owners along the route, some of them absolutely refusing to sell, and others demanding exorbitant rates for the land desired for the road. All reasonable offers of the commission having been rejected, the only course now open is that outlined in the resolution offered by Mr. Welch at the meeting of the city council last evening. It is claimed that at this time there is no very pressing need for a larger supply of water, but as the money is available for the purpose, there is no reason for delay in preparing for the future. Then again, the expenditure of the money necessary to construct the pipe line would in itself do much to improve the condition of affairs in the city. Under the circumstances the proper steps would be to condemn the property required, and proceed at once to devote the money to the purpose for which the city's credit was used.

It is peculiar that the advocates of the free coinage of silver in this country are constantly assuming in their arguments, if not openly asserting, that France has free coinage of both metals. France does not buy nor coin an ounce of silver, save for small change. It has been many years since there was a five-franc piece minted in France. Bi-metallic France has been strengthening herself in gold steadily, but her freedom of silver in the mints was stopped long ago, and there is no advocate in the country of its assumption. Anywhere, in any gold standard nation in the world, free coinage of silver at the present ratio would force the silver standard—that means, would cut the value of money down 35 per cent, and anyone who does not know it belongs in the incurable ward.

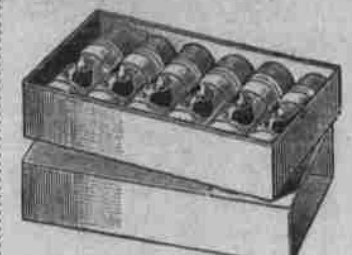
