RULES FOR PILOTS.

Laws for Their Guide Laid Down by

Following are the revised rules adopted by the commissioners for the guidnce of pilots:

Rule i. The term, speaking a vessel for pilot service, shall be construed to Take the Daily Asto- mean either by the usual form of halling, or, if out of halling distance, then the international code of signals shall be made use of.

Rule 2, That the captain of the State pilot schooner shall at no time give up his charge of the pilot schooner to any one under any circumstances without written consent of the majority of the

Rule 3. It shall be the captain's duty to notify all the pilots of the hour of sailing when ready to go to sea, and order them to be on board at the appointed time.

Rule 4. If after due notice any pilot is not on board at the time appointed for sailing, it shall be the captain's duty to report the same to the secretary of the Board at once.

Rule 5. It shall be the duty of the pilots to keep the pilots boat in seaworthy condition, under the supervision

Rule 6. No spirituous liquor shall be allowed on board the schooner, and any pllot known to be under the influence of liquor shall be deemed guilty of mis-

Rule 7. Neither the captain nor any pilots shall be allowed to contract any day of July, 1893. debt against the pilot boat without the on receipt of which we will send the written consent of a majority of the

Rule 8. Whenever any master, agent or consignee of any sailing vessel shall desire to make a complaint against umn pages, in a neat attractive cover, any pilot licensed by this Board, said master, agent or consignee shall file with the secretary of this Board a written complaint duly verified as a complaint in a civil action, and shall deposit with the secretary the sum of forty dollars, taking his receipt there for, and in case said pilot shall be found guilty of the charges so preferred against him, then the money deposited by said master, agent or conignee shall be returned to him, and all expenses attending the examination of pilots on charges so preferred shall be taxed against the party in default.

> Rule 9. If any pilot refuses to comply with these rules or disobeys the order or orders of the master of the schooner or order or orders of the Board of Pilot Commissioners, he shall be deemed guilty of willful misconduct and violation of his duties as a pilot, shall be liable to suspension or re moval.

Rule 12 The Pilot boat shall have a log book which shall be kept by the captain, in which shall be recorded the name, nativity and age of every person attached to said schooner, the regular occurrences of the day, weather cours es and distances, vessels spoken, ect, Said log book shall at all times be open to the inspection of the Board of Pilot Commissioners, or such person or per

sons as they may designate. Rule 13, Every person applying for examination as River Pilot and licenses before the Board shall make such ap plication in his own hand writing and such applicant must have a practical knowledge of the currents, tides, soundings bearings and distances of the several shoals, rocks, points of lands, lights and fog signals of or pertaining to the navigation of the Columbia and Willamette rivers, and shall understand the handling of square-rigged vessels

under full sail, such as getting them under way, and sailing across the bay, and bringing ship to, under sail, until such time said vessel can secure towage, etc.
