It was decided, upon motion, to play the second match of the series between teams representing America and Great Britain on next Tuesday evening.

The question of giving a series of three concerts under the auspices of the club, was discussed at length, the object being to donate the proceeds to assisting the Library Association in its scope of usefulness.
