A GOOD LAW.

Under the above caption the Pacific Journal says: "The past session of the Superior Court was one of interest to the citizens and property holders of this portion of Pacific county. At this term of court the cases of the parties convicted before the justice courts for violating the provisions of the law passed by the last legislature, regarding pound nets and fish traps, were brought before the court on appeal, and a conviction has followed in each and every instance, Judge Langhorn passed on the constitutionality of the law, and also gave an opinion that a person violating the provisions of the act would be guilty of an offense for each day that such pound nets or fish traps were operated, this honor also held that the commencing of the construction of a pound net with out the lawful distance required by law, was a violation, in other words, it is not necessary that a pound net or fish trap, without the proper distance, must be fully completed and in operation, before the owner thereof could be prosecuted."

Just where the editor of the Journal got the above, or just how he got it, is of no special interest, but from whatever source it came, it is also largely without foundation in truth.

The plain facts of the case are that the question of the constitutionality of the act was not brought into question, or raised by motion, argument or other wise in Judge Langhorn's court. The only case tried was that of the State vs Fredinburg, in which the jury did agree without having arrived at a verdict, and were discharged by the court. All the other cases were by agreed statement of the facts, taken on appeal to the supreme court, Judge Langhorn remarking at the time that the title to the act provided no penalty, nor made it a misdemeanor; that he did not feel it his duty and province to pass on the validity and constitutionality of the act, but that he thought the objections to the complaints on appeal were well taken and he would leave the question to a higher court to pass upon.

Corbett having scooped the honors in boxing is now going in for fencing; the latter accomplishment is chiefly manifest in his endeavors to stave off a fight with Mitchell the English cham pion; and his expression of willingness to meet Peter Jackson, in June 1894 or '95 or '96 or somewhere thereabouts. The sporting public is lucky. Just now, the folk here is off on a vacation, for all the idiotic sapsheads who pour coin into the coffers of such duffers as the present day ringers, not one would remain if the F. K. were to get in his work. It is an insult to the memory of Molyneux, Morrissey, Isaac, Edigo, Heenan, Burke, Tom Sayers and lots of other plucky fighters, to put the modern pugilist in the list of fighting men.

It is rumored down in Coos and Douglas counties that the Canadian Pacific is going to take hold of the magnificently prospectived Coos Bay, Roseburg and Eastern road, and put it through over mountain and plain, and up and down, and across, till the whole

of Southern Oregon and that portion of "The Lord's Moral Vineyard" is fairly gridironed. After that is done maybe the Canadians will turn their attention to the mouth of the Columbia, and build a tributary road from here or there to somewhere. Possibly they might do it sooner for the subsidy in sight, and the manifest advantages to ensue. It would do any harm to talk about it.

The news from New York, Montreal and London, this morning indicate that the culminating point of the panic has been reached, and that speculative values have about reached bed rock. When call loans go to 10 per cent, and such securities as Western Union to below 68, or New York Central to 92, there cannot be much more damage done, for these stocks represent more real worth than they are quoted at.

Attempt at Suicide.

It Might Have Been Prevented.

[From the Boston Post.] While the walks in the Public Garden were crowded yesterday afternoon about 4:30 o'clock, people near the entrance gates at the corner of Beacon and Charles streets were horrified to see a man suddenly plunge a knife repeatedly into his throat and fall to the ground.

While waiting for a conveyance an officer questioned the would-be suicide, who was about 50 years of age, as to his name, address, and reason for wishing to end his life, but the man steadfastly refused to give any information regarding himself. He was taken to the Massachusetts General Hospital and surgical attention given him. Although weak from loss of blood it is probable he will recover. About 9 o'clock last night a hospital attendant got a little information from him. He said his name was Samuel D., and that he came some weeks ago from New Brunswick. The last few days his head had felt queer, and he has been wondering about the city, not knowing which way to turn. What impelled him to commit his rash act he was unable to say.

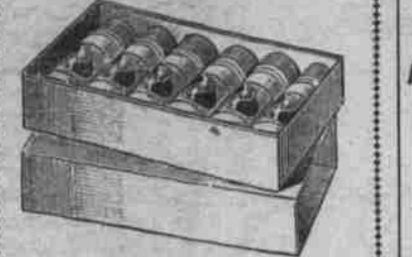
