John Hansen

Arraigned,

John Hansen, who so brutally murdered his old wife on Wednesday afternoon last at Bear Creek, was arraigned in the justice court yesterday. By stipulation of counsel for the state and Hon. C. W. Fulton, representing defendant, the case was continued until Thursday afternoon. Hansen's demeanor was cool and collected, and he has evidently recovered from the temporary weakness and remorse which he displayed when Sheriff Smith secured the confession last Saturday.

Sheriff Smith's firmness and foresight prevented any lawless demonstrations on Saturday night; and has had the effect of smoothing whatever feelings of restlessness or revenge remained in the breasts of the unfortunate Mrs. Hansen's fellow-country men.

It is not generally known how imminent an attack on the jail was that night; but it is certain that only the reports of scouts sent from Uppertown to ascertain "the lay of the land," and their assurance that the sheriff had made ample arrangements, and taken all precautions to guard his prisoner, prevented the expected leaders of the mob from coming forward.
