At the regular meeting of the city council last night, Councilman Welch presided. There were present Councilmen Barker, O'Hara, McGregor, Lewis, Thomson, and Bergman. Minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.—Officers pay rolls for the month of August were passed and ordered paid.—The sum of \$6 refunded to J. H. D. Gray, pound charges for a horse captured without cause.—Mrs. McKenzie's petition to build a woodshed at the foot of West Ninth street was granted.—City surveyor reported on the advisability of building a tunnel watershed 27x22 feet to drain through Shively's and Adair's Astoria and prevent land from sliding. Report adopted.—Decided that henceforth the city should pay the rent of the city surveyor's office.—The report of the assessor on the Wall street assessments received and adopted. The assessments showed on the average a charge of about \$62 on each lot. Further action on the subject was postponed to the next meeting in order to give Wall street property holders an opportunity to file acceptance of the installment terms with the police judge.—The resignation of Dr. Walker as city health officer was received. It was decided to pay him \$500 for all services rendered to date.—The committee on fire and water reported that they could not advise any curtailment in the fire departments at the present time.—The report of the city surveyor on the water line to Bear creek was received. The report stated that the other surveys had not defined with any degree of accuracy the amount of property it would be necessary to purchase from each individual through whose land the pipe would run. The matter was referred to a special committee—Thomson, O'Hara, and Bergman, who will confer with the water commissioners and see what steps are necessary in order to get water to the city by the new line.—Decided that the account of the city surveyor for drawing profile be paid out of water works fund, and that the account for abstracting the property through which the line runs be presented to the water commission for settlement.—Council adjourned.

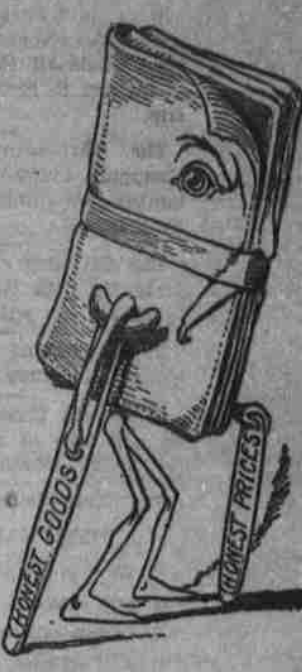
