Impressive Funeral Services Over the Body of Lieut. Sydenham,

Lieutenant Alvin H. Sydenham of the Fifth Artillery, died at Fort Canby on Sunday morning at 1 o'clock, after a brief illness. The news of the sad af-Washington, Sept. 11.-In the senate friends the popular young officer had made in this city and was received with feelings of the most profound regret. Until Friday last, it was not supposed that his illness would prove of a serious, much less a fatal character. About ten days ago an eruption of a carbunculous nature appeared on his nose, but he attached no significance to to its provisions and effect. Referring it at the time. On Sunday, the 3d, he went to the beach, accompanied by Mrs. Sydenham, and dined with Mr. Knapp. The following day he complained of feeling unwell and was re Surgeon Dr. Raymond. The disease did not develop until Friday, when it was seen to be erysipelas. For the last twelve hours before death ensued, he Friday that Dr. Raymond became uncasy, and on Saturday he concluded to telegraph Dr. Walker to come over and consult with him. Dr. Walker went to the Fort on the Ocean Wave, arriving there at 8 p. m., but the end had alnost come, and at 1 o'clock on Sunday morning, the bright younng officer passed away.

Lieutenant Sydenham's heart was never in good condition physically, and his sudden death was due, in a large neasure to that fact.
