

KRUG HAS SKIPPED.

City Treasurer of Seattle Gets Away With a Big Haal. Seattle, Wash., Sept. 12.—A sensation was caused here tonight by the statement that City Treasurer Krug was defaulting to the amount of \$200,000. A statement was made by the Post-Intelligencer in an editorial that it would give \$500 to any worthy charitable institution if City Treasurer Krug could produce the \$200,000 which the last statement of the city comptroller showed should be in the city treasury. This caused the finance committee of the city council to make an investigation which resulted in finding but \$70,000 in the city vaults. Treasurer Krug could not be found. It is believed he has gone to British Columbia, as he has not been seen since morning. A warrant for his arrest has been sworn out. Krug was highly esteemed here, and had amassed quite a fortune by close business methods. It is said he gave large sums of city money to speculators to buy up city scrip at a large discount. This scrip was all covered by the issue of bonds which it was thought would be sold in June. The financial stringency prevented the sale of the bonds and over \$200,000 of the city's money is therefore in the hands of speculators who hold the city's scrip which cannot be realized upon until the bonds are sold. Late this evening the mayor formally removed Krug from office and appointed Edward O. Graves, president of the Washington National Bank an acting treasurer.

Baino, Wash., Sept. 12.—City Treasurer Krug, Seattle's defaulting treasurer, boarded the Great Northern train at Ballard this morning and crossed the line into British Columbia. An officer left here tonight in pursuit of him.

CONGRESS OF BUSINESS MEN. Washington, Sept. 12.—The National Congress of Business Men met here today. One hundred representatives of the boards of trade of the principal cities are present. D. R. James of New York called the assembly to order, saying that the object of the meeting was to call for the immediate repeal of the purchasing clause of the Sherman act, and to consider the financial interests of the country. B. H. Warner of Washington, was chosen temporary chairman.

THE CHARGE DECLARED PROVEN. Toronto, Can., Sept. 12.—The trial of Prof. Campbell, for heresy began today before the Montreal Presbytery. The first charge was "His view of the inspiration of the Scriptures, discrediting that there is a supreme and infallible source of religious truth." After a lengthy and heated debate the charge was declared proven, by 21 to 12.
