First -All amounts under \$50 paya ole on or before November 1st, 1893.

Third.-15 per cent, thereof payable April 1st, 1894.

August 1st, 1894. Fifth. -20 per cent. thereof payable

Sixth .- 20 per cent. thereof payable April 1st, 1895.

Seventh .- 10 per cent. thereof payable August 1st, 1895.

signed by ninety-eight per cent. of de positors having fifty (\$50.00) or more each, on deposit with said I. W. Case July 31st, 1893.

The above is substantially the sam basis on which the suspended banks of Portland have resumed and are resum ing, and will go into operation with a 5 per cent rate of interest on all pay ments. That is to say, depositors will get everything they have entrusted to Mr. Case, and an additional 5 per cent of interest besides. The Commercial National Bank in Portland, it is stated, will pay 4 per cent, to its depositors the People's Savings Bank of Sar Francisco, which reopened last week only paying 2 per cent. So it will be seen that the terms offered by Mr. Case are a good deal better than those of the great majority of the institutions which suspended at the time of the panic. The bank will be open from 9 to 12 a. m., and from 2 to 4 p. m. for the convenience of depositors who wish

It is believed, however, that even this one, after investigation will come in the above, deposits will be received in amounts of one dollar and upward.
